MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



After the unexpected difficulties of 2020, everyone hoped and anticipated a better turn when the new year arrived. Sadly, our expectations remained unfulfilled.

It is needless to describe or explain the difficulties we all faced.

Besides the common uncertainties of our everyday lives, the canine world suffered its own losses.

We lost friends and colleagues, leaving emptiness behind. Breeders and trainers could not go on with their planned activities. Organisers had no choice, but to repeatedly or entirely cancel dog shows and sporting events throughout this hectic year, though some bigger dog shows – including the FCI World Dog Show – and sporting events finally had the chance to happen. The FCI General Assembly also could not gather in accordance with its schedule for the mere reason of low participation due to international travel restrictions.

Such a period was a massive burden on the shoulders of all of us. Both on individual and organisation levels. It is always hard to carry on, stay creative, and stick to original plans during such long-lasting and challenging times.

Besides all difficulties, the FCI did its best to keep going with its original strategy and plans while maintaining its flawless daily operation.

For the first time in our history, the FCI and especially its professional PR team held a Webinar to the representatives of the national canine organizations about handling anti-breeding propaganda around us and how to make further “branding” of our organisation, in order to get it even more rewarded. The over 200 participants from all 5 continents of all 3 FCI Sections were unprecedented. Its huge success and the discussions followed by gives a directive and advised strategy for dealing with these very recent and acute subjects.

To better understand our organisation, we launched our podcast channel. The episodes cover exciting talks about the operation of the FCI and its different commissions, and involve dog welfare related topics to give insight into the importance of responsible breeding.

Besides animal welfare, the importance of the younger generation is also unquestionable. The FCI Youth Commission got re-established in the second part of the year with new members and a new, enthusiastic drive.

We have many plans and ongoing projects. We honestly hope that we will have the possibility to complete them step by step instead of fighting the consequences of unpredictable situations.

I cannot express my gratitude enough to everyone who was my partner during the completion of such projects and the daily operation of the FCI during the last year.

I thank all our members and contract partners, my colleagues at the FCI General Committee, the FCI Office, and anyone involved in any kind of activity for their stamina and dedication.

Introduction

Established in 1911, the FCI includes 98 Members and Contract Partners (one member per country). Each Member issues their own pedigrees and train highly-qualified judges. The FCI makes sure that the pedigrees and judges are mutually recognised by all the FCI members, Contract Partners and any person involved in their domestic canine scene.

In accordance with the celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Fédération Cynologique Internationale, the FCI General Committee reviewed its Mission, Vision Statement and Values to maintain the Association's leadership worldwide.

In 2018, further to the decision of the FCI Extraordinary General Assembly, FCI's Mission, Vision Statements and Values were revised as follows:

Mission and Vision statement

The FCI is the highest authority of the canine culture and supports, via sits Members and Contract Partners, the well-being of pedigree dogs worldwide as well as their selective breeding and generational registrations.

The FCI is responsible for safeguarding pedigree dogs' health and international pedigree dog activities to enhance the relations between dogs and humans.

The FCI recognises that the following principles and professional responsibilities are fundamental for the well-being of all pedigree dogs worldwide:

Values

- a/ The FCI considers pedigree dogs' health, temperament and behaviour of utmost importance in Breed Standards.
- b/ The FCI promotes pedigree dogs' activities and sports worldwide, which it considers beneficial for the pedigree dogs.
- c/ The FCI entrusts its commissions to make recommendations about other important matters.
- d/ The FCI divides geographically the world of pedigree dogs through its three (3) sections.
- e/ The FCI trusts its Members and Contract Partners to protect the integrity of their National Registries.
- f/ The FCI recognises and respects agreements with non-member national organisations.
- g/ The FCI sets the highest standards for its Head Office.
- h/ The FCI ensures the regular celebration of World and Section Championship events.

Die FCI stellt sicher, dass die Ahnentafeln und Richter innerhalb der FCI von allen Mitgliedern, Vertragspartnern und allen in der Hundeszene tätigen Personen anerkannt werden.

Im Rahmen des 100-jährigen Jubiläums der Fédération Cynologique Internationale hat der FCI-Vorstand seine Mission-Statement und seine Vision-Statement sowie die Werte überarbeitet um die weltweite Führungsposition der Vereinigung in der Kynologie zu erhalten.

In 2018 wurden nach Beschluss der Außerordentlichen Generalversammlung der FCI Mission-, Vision- Statement und Werte der FCI wie folgt überarbeitet:

- e/** Sie vertraut ihren Mitgliedern und Vertragspartnern, dass sie die Integrität ihrer nationalen Register schützen.
- f/** Die FCI anerkennt und respektiert Abkommen mit nationalen Hundeverbänden, die keine FCI-Mitglieder sind.

- h/** Die FCI sorgt für die regelmäßige Durchführung von Championaten auf Welt- und Sektionsebene.

2020 was definitely the worse year I have experienced during my mandate, which started in 1998, but 2021 will not be remembered as a most brilliant year! Of course, in 2020, Covid-19 had a lesser world impact, but we cannot state that we had a "normal" or even less a "good" year.

As always, before commenting on the main achievements and decisions made by the FCI in 2020, allow me to pay a tribute to people who were appreciated and respected, but who – sadly - passed away.

On 19 March, 11 April and 22 May, 2021, we were all so saddened and surprised to hear that **Revaz Khomasuridze** (RU), **Gregory Eva** (SA) and **Dr Eugene Yerusalimsky** (RU) had passed away.

Beside his long career as RKF officer, and on top of his brilliant judge career, Revaz was a very well-known world-

wide breeder of top winning French Bulldogs, with strong health and fabulous temperament, under the kennel name **A'Vigdors**.



Greg was a truly appreciated person and he will leave a huge impact on the relations between the FCI and the organisation, which he chaired for so many years, the Kennel Union of Southern Africa.



Eugene was a great personality of the Russian Kynological Federation (RKF), an excellent judge, breeder and a person loved and appreciated by everyone. He is the person responsible for bringing the RKF into the FCI

family and his legacy will live on as one of the giants of Russian cynology.

We lost three friends and much valued and appreciated colleagues.

In case more persons passed away, without us being notified, I apologise if I have failed to mention them!

International CACIB conformation shows

As explained earlier, compared with 2020, 2021 was a "better" year even though the activities of nearly all our Members and Contract Partners were at a standstill for a couple of months (Jan-May).

As you will see from the table below, the situation improved, even though we remain very far from our "traditional" statistics (see 2018-2019). As I said in my earlier report, we could not wait for miracles for 2021, but we surely saw a small light in the tunnel.

Despite the chaotic global sanitary situation, the organising national canine organisations, often in cooperation with the relevant FCI Commissions, managed to cope with the whole set of requirements (health, security, checks, etc.). Congratulations and thanks to all of them!

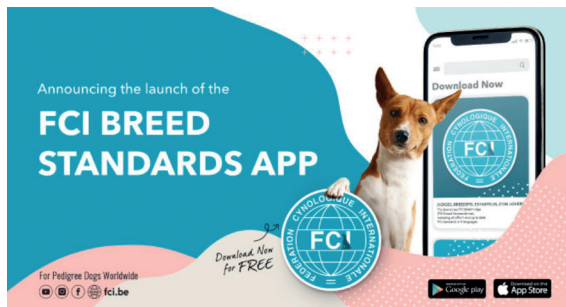

This application is a mirror of our official Breed Nomenclature and will provide the visitor, at any time, with updated documents. It is available, for free, in Google Play and Apple Store.



Public Relations

In March and April, thanks to the help of our efficient PR team, we gave a webinar on **"How to Fight Anti-breeding Propaganda and Its Consequences."**

How to Effectively Disseminate the Spirit of the Materials sent by the FCI to its Target Groups". Each FCI Section had its own session and we are proud to announce that a total of 196 people attended the webinars (Europe: 89, Asia, Africa and Oceania: 64, Americas and Caribbean: 43 + all the FCI General Committee members).

In May, in cooperation with our Partner, Royal Canin, we held the « Pro-Experts Forum » online. The objective of Royal Canin was to inform and encourage our Members and Contract Partners to support and improve educational activities and to implement modern DNA-testing tools. That was heavily followed and successfully conducted.

In October, we have also launched a series of Podcasts dealing with very different issues related to dogs. They all are available on our website: **Launch of THE FCI PODCAST on October 12 2021.** To date, we have recorded and published more than 15 of them.

Bulgarian Republican Federation of Cynology (BRFC)

Unfortunately, at BRFC request, the FCI General Committee approved the termination of the BRFC full membership with the FCI, effective from 1st January 2022. The different talks and measures taken were extensively discussed and published, in order to inform correctly and adequately our Members and the Bulgarian breeders.

To end up, let me express my warmest thanks to the FCI General Committee members, the FCI Members and Contract Partners, to all the presidents of the FCI commissions and to our devoted FCI Staff for their good cooperation, despite the difficult period that we have been through.

FCI STANDARDS COMMISSION - Activity report

We held our annual Standards Commission meeting by videoconference (Zoom) on Wednesday, March 24th.

The Standards Commission's main work continues to be the revision and adaptation of new and existing standards. The focus on dog's health continues to make countries review the text in standards extra carefully, to avoid wordings that may result in interpretations that can lead to exaggerations that might cause health risks in the dogs.

The Commission continuously amends or thoroughly revises standards and the co-operation with the national organisations is usually efficient. Still, the procedure has to go through several steps before a standard can be published, these documents are the backbone in the work of the FCI and its member countries.

Viewing the text in standards from a health and welfare perspective has been intensified. This is not always according the wish of the countries of origin, but it is in the interest of keeping the breeds for the future; we all have to realise that exaggerations in type, as well as character issues in dogs might not only affect the health of the dogs, it may also increase the risk to have breeds banned by law.

We marked a working method within the Commission about how to manage the standards, since the moment they are received at the Head Office, until they are seen and discussed by the Commission, then sent back to the Country of Origin and then to the General Committee for approval before publication.

FCI SHOW COMMISSION - Activity report

This is my second annual report as President of the Show Commission – and what a year to look back on!

Unfortunately, in 2021 we had to cancel our FCI Show and Show Judges Commission meetings, which should have been held in Italy – in cooperation with ENCI.

Due to the accelerating pandemic worldwide, both Commissions first chose to postpone the meetings. We had both May and October 2021 as proposals - but as the situation developed, we chose to postpone it completely until 2022.

The 2022 meeting was scheduled to be in Riga, but again - we had to cancel our FCI Show and Show Judges Commission meetings, due to the Covid19 situation.

Right now, we have planned to hold a one-day meeting in connection with the 2022 Section Winner Show in Paris. Hopefully, we will be able to have the meetings at that time.

As we have not had meetings in our Commissions during the past two years and as no FCI General Assembly has been held in the same period, there are no political decisions to be informed about.

2021 highlights

The World Dog Show 2021 was organised by Czech Republic's canine organisation (ČMKU) in the end of September/beginning of October in Brno - and was well completed and settled, with the necessary initiatives in relation to Covid19. The total number of dogs entered was **12,159**.

The Section show in the Americas and the Caribbean Section 2021 was organised by the Peruvian canine organisation (KCP) in the middle of November in Lima. The total number of dogs entered was **837**.

The Section show in the European Section 2021 was organised by the Hungarian canine organisation (MEOES) in the end of December in Budapest. The total number of dogs entered was **10,801**.



The Section show in the Asia, Africa and Oceania Section, which was postponed from 2021 until 16 January 2022 in Quezon City, Philippines, has now been cancelled.

I had hoped, I could write more about many other great highlights, for the year under review, in the different countries and regions, in this second year as President of the FCI Show Commission, BUT – like the first year, it has been an awful year with lots of cancelled shows, due to the Covid-19 situation.

The World Dog Show in Madrid (2020) Spain has been postponed until 2022.

The Section show in Europe, in Celje (2020) Slovenia, was at the first time postponed until May 2021, but after a new period with Covid19, the Slovenian canine organisation decided to cancel the show.



Statistics for 2021

Right now, we can conclude that there were less CACIB shows cancelled than the number of completed CACIB shows. Last year, there were more cancelled shows compared to the number of shows that were held.

A total of **1,236** CACIB shows were planned, but unfortunately only 798 CACIB shows were held.

The number distributed by section: Europe **628** CACIB shows completed and **351** cancelled, The Americas & the Caribbean **110** CACIB shows completed and **38** cancelled, Asia, Africa & Oceania **62** CACIB shows completed and **47** cancelled.

Thanks to my colleagues in the Show Commission, Ms Ekaterina Domogatskaya and Mr Bojan Matakovic, and to my cooperating President from the Show Judges Commission, Mr Adrian Landarte. My thanks go as well to the FCI Head Office, to Mr Yves De Clercq and his professional staff, and to our representative from the FCI General Committee, Ms Barbara Müller.

Let us together look forward to a much better 2022, with lots of activities and a world that returns to a safe and normal everyday life - with lots of great shows.

FCI GROOMING COMMISSION - Activity report

As there wasn't any physical activity that could be held due to Covid, the Commission held its meetings online with the aim of improving the standards of grooming worldwide.

The 3rd FCI Grooming Commission Meeting via Zoom – September 7th, 2021

The 3rd FCI Grooming Commission Meeting was held via Zoom on September 7th, 2021. The delegates from Japan, China, Philippines, Puerto Rico, South Korea, Singapore and Taiwan were present. The Commission confirmed the amendments to the FCI Grooming Competition Regulations, which considered the welfare of grooming dogs, timing of Category 3 and progression in class/category. The technical committee presented on implementation plans and timeline with regards to:

1. FCI Grooming Judge Qualifications
2. Guideline of World Competitions
3. Decision on 1st FCI Groomers World Championship (host and country)

The technical committee of the Commission will be made up by be four members from Japan, Taiwan, Korea & Puerto Rico. Discussion on issuance of certifications of FCI Grooming Competition were first proposed. Mr Satoshi Bessho, President of the FCI Grooming Commission, also proposed 2,00 EUR / entry fee from each contestant payable to FCI.

The 1st Technical Committee Meeting of the FCI Grooming Commission via Zoom – November 30th, 2021

Ms Hidemi Nakajima, Head of the Technical Committee, held the 1st Technical Committee Meeting of the FCI Grooming Commission via Zoom on November 30th, 2021. The members from Japan, Taiwan, Korea & Puerto Rico was present. Great length of discussion were on drafts of the Specifications for the Organisation of the FCI Grooming World Championship, FCI Regulations for Grooming Judges, FCI Guidelines for Grooming Judges and Score Sheets. Further discussions were needed to finalise the details.

The 4th FCI Grooming Commission Meeting via Zoom – December 9th, 2021

The 4th FCI Grooming Commission Meeting was held via Zoom on December 9th, 2021. The delegates from Japan, China, Finland, Philippines, Puerto Rico, South Korea, Singapore and Taiwan, observers from Thailand and Belgium, and Mr Augusto Benedicto Santos, FCI General Committee's liaison Board member, were present. Delegates voted via the poll to appoint Taiwan to be the host for the 1st FCI Groomers World Championship in April 2023. The below proposals were made to the General Assembly for:

1. The FCI Grooming Commission will collect the fees for the certificates issued (20 EUR per certificate) and will remit the fees to FCI on a monthly basis.
2. The FCI Grooming Commission will send a report on the number of certificates issued, not more than a month after every show.
3. The FCI Grooming Commission and the FCI office will tally the certificates issued on a regular basis.
4. South Korea (Korea Kennel Federation) will be the treasurer of the FCI Grooming Commission, Korea Kennel Federation will collect the money from the Kennel Clubs and remit the money to the FCI Office.
5. The certificates will be printed by the NCOs with the serial numbers on the certificates being issued by the Commission. FCI will not have to undertake the task of printing the certificates and sending them.

FCI COMMISSION FOR HERDING DOGS - Activity report

Annual meeting

The FCI Herding Dogs Commission's annual meeting 2021 had to be cancelled due to the spread of the covid-19 virus.

An online meeting was held on November 20th, 2021. This meeting was attended by 12 delegates.

FCI Herding events – Herding in our countries

FCI Herding activities were organised in Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Finland, France, Germany, Hungary, Italy, The Netherlands, Russia, Sweden, Switzerland, Ukraine.

Czech Republic – Mrs Daniela Rajova

In the Czech Republic, as well as in other countries, the last 2 seasons have been affected by the Covid situation. Several trials have been cancelled, as well as planned clinics for CS and TS judges.

I firmly believe that the situation will be more stable next year: we could have a normal herding season again. We are completing the calendar of herding events for the next year those days. The clinic for TS and CS judges will be held in 2022.

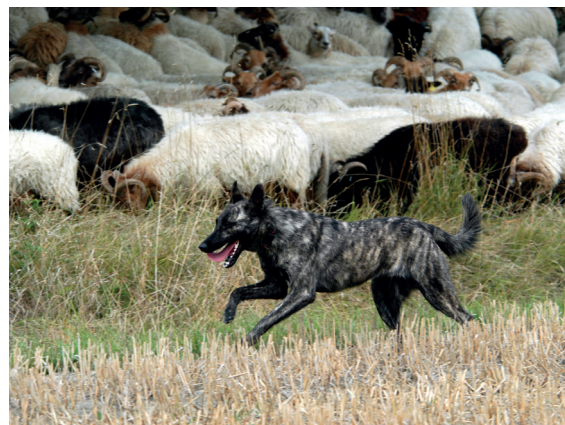
In the Czech Republic, the TS style trials are only under the FCI rules, so the total number of starts for dogs was not dramatically limited. Unfortunately,

the situation is different in the CS style. The cancellation of several larger FCI trials limited the number of dogs which could step up to next class. Now there are fewer dogs qualified for IHT 2 and IHT 3. Due to this situation there is not anymore motivation for the organisers to make their trials under the FCI rules. The number of participants on FCI trial is very limited in higher classes at the moment. Due to this situation, the number of non FCI trials is growing, compared to the past. I perceive it as a great pity for FCI herding. I think we should discuss this and try to find a solution, and make FCI herding more open to competitors.

Italy – Mr Luigi Cavalchini

It was a difficult period; we have been in a severe lock down from February 2020. During this period, it was not possible to carry out activities, even outdoor. We started the activities again in May 2021. The recovery was very enthusiastic, because people felt the need to start over. The number of people registered for tests and trials is currently high. The closure period was very difficult for the fields that had to keep the sheep without income, but fortunately we did not lose trials fields.

We have several international trials planned for next year and we will be pleased to have competitors from other countries. The test schedule will be published on the CLB website. During the lockdown, we organ-

ised seminars, which were appreciated by the club members.

In Italy, the international rules used are the FCI ones; the national rules are slightly different. We also accept registrations of non-pedigree dogs, as there are rural breeds in the process of being recognised; we recognise ISDS pedigreed Border Collies with relative background.

On TS courses, the judge has more responsibility to design the course; we use slightly different judging sheets. We hope that the Commission, in the coming months, can discuss these differences.

Usually, we gave about 7 Trials for both styles, CACTR titles awarded in each class with mark Excellent and 1st place and FCI pedigree.

Ukraine Herding Champion title awards to dog who have 2 CACTR titles (one in 1 or 2 class and 3 class obligatory).

Next week we'll have CACITR trial.

For now- for 5.5 yeas- Ukraine have only 3 Herding Champion- so its quite difficult to receive it.

Every trial - about 20 dogs in all 3 classes in Traditional Style and about 15 dogs in Collection Style.

Herding Working Test every year passes about 20 dogs for both styles.

NHAT - about 50 dogs each year.

More accurate numbers we'll have later, after all reports are sended to the club, usually in December.

In Ukraine 2 judges.

1 International judge - Nemchenko Maryna, 1 Judge who can judge CACTR titles - Podlin Artem.

And 1 who can judge NHAT for Traditional Style.

European Championships

In 2021 the number of FCI Herding Trials was far less than usual, due to the Covid-19 pandemic. In half of our countries, the organising of trials, even without public, was not allowed.

This had consequences for the planned FCI European Herding Championship. It wouldn't be fair and it wouldn't be a real European championship, if only competitors of a few countries would have a chance to qualify.

Therefore the Hungarian canine organisation and the FCI Herding Dogs Commission made a decision to postpone the FCI European Herding Championship to 20-24th of September 2023.

New FCI rules for livestock guarding dogs

In our Commission, a working group is active developing rules for testing and trial for livestock protecting breeds.

The Working Group for Rules for Livestock Guarding Dogs did a good job, preparing Rules for a Test especially for these Breeds. These Rules were approved by the FCI Herding Dogs Commission and presented to the General Committee in 2022.

2018 – Looking back on FCI HERDING TESTS AND TRIALS

FCI Herding is a rather young discipline. The first FCI Rules for Herding Tests and Trials were operative since January 1st 2008.

At the start, in 2018, the Commission expected that there would be few possible training places and facilities for organising trials. And it had to be seen if pedigree dogs still possessed the qualities to perform their original jobs.

Still in many countries it is difficult to organise more than a few trials per year, depending on the climate, the landscape and on the cooperation of sheep farmers and shepherds with sufficient and suitable sheep. Nowadays the Traditional Style (for all shepherd dog breeds, except Border Collie) is more popular than the FCI Collecting Style.

In general, the number of international trials is increasing, the number of participants is increasing, the number of participating breeds is increasing. And last but not least: the quality of the work of dogs and handlers has impressively improved!

In many countries, shepherds and sheep farmers are getting more and more interested working pedigree dogs, which are doing so well in tests and trials. Really remarkable is that many participating dogs in Herding Trials are also show champions. Beautiful and sound inside and outside!

The list of breeds which may participate in FCI Herding Tests and Trials is drawn up by the Herding Dogs Commission, by studying the breed standards, especially the chapters 'History' an 'Utilisation', and by looking for evidence that dogs of these breeds are still working on sheep or cattle.

On the list, there are 48 breeds, spread over different FCI Breed Groups. Among these 48 breeds, 16 breeds need a working test according to the FCI nomenclature.

The breeds in the Traditional Style vary in the way they move, in size, coat and working style. It is remarkable that so much talent for herding still is present, even in breeds we all know as typical show breeds.

Since January 1st 2013, in the highest class of the Herding Trials, a CACITR (Certificat d'Aptitude au Championnat International de Troupeau de la FCI)

may be awarded. It is one of the conditions for dogs to qualify for the title of FCI Herding Champion.

All shepherd dogs, those which need a working tests and those who don't, but are allowed by the canine club of the country of origin, are eligible for the title of FCI Herding Champion, as a recognition of their herding abilities. However, this title does not qualify for the FCI Working Champion title.

One of the first FCI Herding Champions was a Shetland Sheepdog. Small in size, big in his mind when worked on the flock. The smallest dog which succeeded in the lowest level, NHAT, is a Schipperke. The big-

gest dogs which compete are dogs like Beaucerons, German Shepherd dogs, etc.

The pictures show dogs of different breeds at work.

Although the activities in 2021 were still impaired by the COVID-19 pandemic, the FCI Herding Dogs Commission looks forward to new activities in the near future.

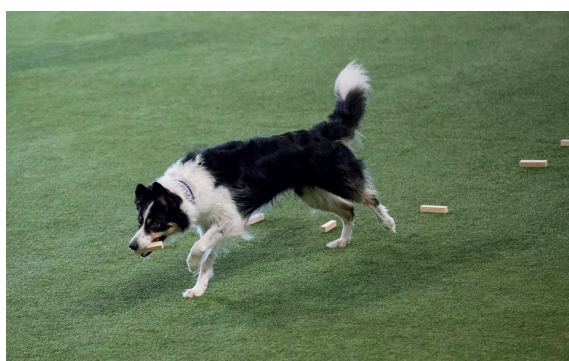

FCI OBEDIENCE COMMISSION - Activity report

Our Commission

Year 2021 was almost as humdrum as 2020. The pandemic, keeping safe and hiding have been the main concerns in most countries. In 2020, we had to postpone and then cancel our World Winner Championship that was planned to take place in Spain, and had to cancel our Commission meeting planned to take place in St. Petersburg.

Obedience rules were also dealt with thoroughly at this meeting. The Commission and the delegates had received several questions and comments about the rules. A significant part of the weekend meeting was spent discussing the rules and demonstrating the new exercises via videos. It was agreed on to write down some last-minute clarifications and corrections in the Obedience rules document.

In this situation, an online meeting was the only and best solution. An online meeting does not fully compensate for a traditional meeting with all participants present at one table. Nevertheless, it was important to have the possibility of an online meeting, to have a look at the rules and to make plans for future events. The online meeting gave some new delegates the possibility to join us. We also welcomed the delegate from China. China was represented for the first time at our Obedience Commission meeting.

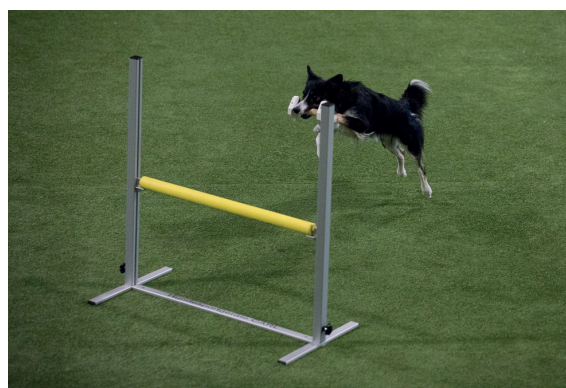
Annual meeting

The FCI Obedience Commission made several efforts to have a Commission meeting in 2021 and a judges' meeting to discuss our new rules valid from 1.1.2022, but without success. The original date to apply the revised rules was beginning of 2021. But the start off had to be delayed by one year, as all efforts to have any meetings were in vain. Even now, when the start off was put off by a year, did we meet some difficulties. All just due to covid.

Several of our Commission members were present at the World Winner Championship in August in Switzerland, so we took the liberty to have a short session together and talk about the situation. We made plans to have our Commission meeting in St. Petersburg, upon the kind invitation of the Russian Kennel Club, but very early in September we learned that the covid situation in many countries was so bad that our meeting there had to be cancelled. A judges' meeting had been planned for spring, postponed and then again for December, but we were not able to have a traditional meeting looking at dogs doing the new exercises and discussing the judging criteria. It was agreed on to have an online Commission meeting. The new

Due to the covid situation, the World Winner Championship 2022 could not be arranged in Latvia as planned. Kindly, The Danish canine organisation suggested, on very short notice, that they could arrange the 2022 championship. The Commission was grateful to get this invitation and decided that the World Winner Championship 2022 would take place in Århus, Denmark, in June at Midsummer.

As the Obedience World Championship 2020 in Spain had to be cancelled, we are looking forward to the possibility to have it in Spain in 2023. The Spanish canine organisation will hopefully pick up our suggestion and invite us. In 2024, the championship is scheduled to be in Russia, and in 2025 in Latvia.

World Winner championship competition 2021

The World Winner competition 2021 in Obedience was arranged in Sagibach, Switzerland, from 12th to 15th August. The competition site was functional and the competition was very well organised under the leadership of Mr Hanspeter Jutzi, chief judge of the championship. Again, due to covid, we had to wait until very late before we could be sure that the event could take place. There were many additional issues that had to be taken care of, due to the pandemic. A restricted number of people could be in the competition hall at the same time and the audience had to pay special attention to their whereabouts; not too many not too close. But all safety precautions were appropriate, and they were followed. Masks were used as well as an abundant amount of disinfectant.

The judges of the competition were: chief judge Mr Hanspeter Jutzi from Switzerland, Mrs Nadine Hess from Switzerland, Mrs Carina Savander-Ranne from Finland, Mr Pedro Marquez from Spain and Mr Uwe Wehner from Germany.

It is always nice to see new nations on the highest podium. This year it was Russia. The Russian team has steadily improved their results and done well also earlier, but this year the Russian team members did an excellent job and achieved first place, the golden medal. The Swedish team was second, receiving the silver medal and the Finnish team was third, receiving the bronze medal.

Twenty competitors had earned their way to the finals on Sunday, on the basis of their performance in the team competition the days before. Finland and Italy had four competitors in the finals, and Russia and Sweden had three. Austria, France, Germany and Switzerland had competitors in the finals as well. It is interesting to see that the team results and the number of finalists from each country does not fully correlate. This shows that it is not easy to choose the team members. So many things influence how you succeed

in a competition of this level. The three medallists are all very experienced handlers, but they were all now competing with somewhat young dogs. They all have excellent results from earlier WWCh competitions, but with older dogs.

One could see that the handlers were not always happy with the points that they received. This might be due to a strict judging, but also maybe the whole covid situation had had some influence on the training and preparing for the WWCh by competing during the summer. Also, the dogs are usually able to stand at the ringside and familiarise themselves with the circumstances. Now they had to jump directly to the hall and the ring from outside. Some dogs were clearly influenced by this. But this was due to the precautions that had to be executed.

Traditionally the President of the Obedience Commission gives a few special prizes. This year only one special prize was awarded, and it went to our white dog. The white dog shows the exercises before the competition starts so that the competitors, judges and stewards are able to see the layout of the competition, ask questions and give comments. The white dog was a Bernese Mountain Dog /Berner Sennenhund. A good choice to have a Swiss breed showing the exercises. Calle Muk is such a charming and friendly dog, and he and his handler Diana Sterling showed the exercises with such excellence that the special prize was awarded to them without any doubt.

FCI RALLY OBEDIENCE COMMISSION - Activity report

First of all let me introduce this kind of dog sports, which is maybe new to some of you:

Rally Obedience (also known as „Rally“ or „Rally-O“) is a dog sport based on Obedience. It was originally devised by Charles L. "Bud" Kramer from the Obedience practice of "doodling" — doing a variety of interesting warmup and freestyle exercises. The doodles were usually parts of Obedience exercises that taught the skills and improved performance and accuracy.

Unlike regular Obedience, instead of waiting for the judge's or steward's orders, the competitors proceed around a course of designated stations with the dog in heel position. The course consists of 10 to 25 signs that instruct the team what to do. Unlike traditional Obedience, handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs during the course.

In the past 15 years, Rally Obedience has become very popular in many of our countries. In my home country, Austria, for example, the first official regulations were set up in 2016 and since that the popularity has grown enormously, becoming the 3rd most popular official dog activity in my country.

Looking through the countries, the variety of different national regulations set up shows an interesting mix of exercises: in some countries, for example, the possibility of changing the heel side (left- or right handling) was determined, in others the mix of two or more signs (so called „More Signs Exercises“) has given a wider space for judges to create new courses.

Since professionalism has grown and the call for international competitions is getting noisier, the FCI General Assembly decided in 2017 to create a Commission to take care of an international regulation for this lovely sort of working together with our „best friend“.

In 2021, many of our plans - again like in 2020 - were thwarted: the COVID-19 pandemics forced us to cancel our face-to-face meetings in Helsinki and Vienna and to organise small online meetings, which reduced the speed in our work. Since Mrs Iiris Harju, elected President of the Commission, resigned in August 2020 due to professional reasons, I am leading the FCI Rally Obedience Commission as Acting President until the next elections in summer 2022, which I am really honoured about.

However, in the year 2021 we had altogether eight online meetings via Skype, where we united and fixed up the set of signs used in international regulations. After that, we worked on the general regulations and the judging guidelines. At the last meeting in November, the Commission decided to intent for an official introduction of the first international rules in Rally Obedience in 2023 and to arrange the 1st FCI Rally Obedience World Winner in 2024.

We all in the Commission are looking forward to a better year 2022, hoping to meet again in face-to-face meetings in Vienna, Austria, in the end of April and in Helsinki, Finland, at the beginning of August. The next online meetings via Skype will be held in the end of February.

FCI COMMISSION FOR SIGHTHOUND SPORT (CSS) – Activity report

For our commission, 2021 was a pivotal year between the FCI Commission of Sighthound Races (CdL) and the FCI Commission of Sighthound Sport (CSS). It was also a year of highs and lows.

A very depressing low was the unfortunate passing away of the Dutch delegate and the secretary of our commission, Chris Bekker on October 6th. This stunned us all. Only 54 years old, Chris lost the fight against a lingering disease that struck him end of 2020. Chris was a very highly estimated 'sighthound person', an active member of our commission and a personal friend. He was our secretary since 2016 and we miss him deeply. He will never leave our thoughts.

The beginning of 2021 coincided with a first glimmer of hope to return to normality. With the roll-out of the covid-vaccines also the sighthound enthusiasts and organisers were triggered once again to revitalise our beloved hobby and passion. Luckily, everyone understood that great flexibility and understanding would be needed to 'get things done'. The FCI circular allowing the organisation of international competitions with CACIL attribution without the obligation

to appoint a foreign judge was a great help. I would therefore like to thank the many organisers, volunteers and, of course, the participants for the (financial and other) risks they were prepared to take during 2021. Without them, there would be no annual report to write.

Along with the various corona waves we all had to endure, many of the events on our sports calendar were either postponed or cancelled. It soon became clear that a European Coursing Championship in Hungary would not be possible before the summer of 2021. All hope was set on a better corona situation in the autumn.

As every upside has its downside, the corona downside had the upside we quickly learned to see and consult each other on digital video-meetings. This contributed to more involvement and a higher frequency of commission meetings. Our working group 'rulebook' went the extra mile to thoroughly revise the FCI Regulations for International Sighthound Racing and Lure Coursing Events. I wish to thank them for their tireless efforts.

FCI Championships 2021

From September 1st till September 5th the 'Windhundenverein Münster', the 'Deutscher Windhundzucht- and Rennverband' (DWZRV) and the 'Verband für das Deutsche Hundewesen' (VDH) hosted and organised the FCI European Sighthound Racing Championship. About 360 of the finest racing sighthounds of Europe competed on the sandtrack during the 4-day event. It was a splendid and well-organised championship with beautiful and highly exciting finals. Results are available on the FCI website.

The organisation of the European Championship Coursing 2020 by Hungary had to be postponed till spring 2021. When also this date seemed to become impossible due to changing covid sanitary rules, Hungary withdrew its candidacy. Luckily, the Netherlands proposed to organise our Championship Coursing in the autumn of 2021.

From October 21st till October 24th the 'Windhondenvereniging Coursing Nienoord Leek' (WvCNL), the 'Commissie voor de Windhondenrensport' (CvW) and the 'Raad van Beheer' hosted and organised the FCI European Sighthound Coursing Championship at Een. More than 800 of the finest coursing sighthounds were registered in the catalogue. They came from 20 countries (19 countries who are member of the CSS and the United Kingdom). 714 dogs started on the three fields situated on and around the beautiful site of camping Ronostrand with its sand beach at a large lake in a wooded area. It was a splendid and well-organised championship with beautiful and high-quality runs. I want to express my gratitude for making such a good championship on such a short notice. Meetings of the commission

The FCI Commission for Sighthound Sport has 2 major priorities:

- Allocation and supervision of the FCI World Championships and CSS World Winner events;
- Keeping the 'FCI Regulations for International Sighthound Races and Lure Coursing Events' and the 'FCI International Guidelines for Lure Coursing Judges' up to date.

Traditionally the meeting of our commission is held together with the European Championship Coursing. However, due to the important agenda and the covid situation we exceptionally had 2 official commission meetings in 2021. They took place as video-meetings on February 6th and May 8th. In addition, there were several informal information meetings of our commission to keep all of our delegates updated.

In our meeting of February 6th, 23 countries out of 24 were represented by their delegates, only 1 was absent. This was the highest number of participating countries in years. Also, Mr G. Jipping, vice-president of the FCI was present in this meeting.

On our meeting of May 8th, 22 countries out of 24 were represented by their delegates.

These meetings completed the preparatory work done by our working group 'rulebook' and resulted in a final proposal of the 5-yearly update of the 'FCI Regulations for International Sighthound Racing and Lure Coursing Events' valid from January 1st, 2022. During the summer of 2021, the FCI General Committee (GC) approved these new regulations, together with the change of name of our commission. The CSS wants to thank the members of the General Committee, and especially Mr Gerard Jipping and Mr Yves Declercq, in the trust we felt and the professional treatment of our proposals.

The CSS is aware that the thorough update of the international rulebook has 'shaken' a part of the sighthound community, primarily within the racing sport. There is a clear break with the past where the height

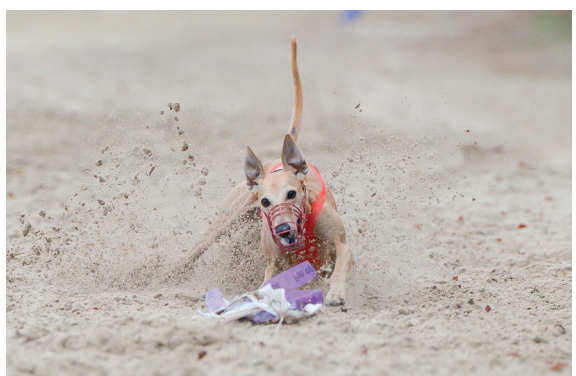

FCI COMMISSION FOR SLEDGE DOGS - Activity report

As for many other activities all over the world, our Commission was affected by the pandemic too. Not from actual infection, but we have not been able to meet for almost 2 years now. Some of our work and the most needed election of bureau has therefore been seriously delayed.

Having finished all necessary regulations and guidelines for sledge dog races, judge education programme etc. from the early start of the Commission in 2008 till 2019, we just needed to have our breeds acknowledged as working breeds in the breed nomenclature, which would reflect their heritage and the wording in their breed standards.

During "lockdown" and with the mandate from the Commission members, the Secretary and I have been quite busy during 2021, preparing proposals for the General Committee for this most wanted change in the breeds nomenclature for those sledge dog breeds, that are not originated within FCI countries; Alaskan Malamute, Canadian Eskimo Dog and Siberian Husky.

With great help from the FCI Head Office, Mr Yves De Clercq and our liaison Mr Jorgen Hindse, and after several weeks of work, we managed to forward a proposal in June 2021. Quite anxious for the response from the GC, our proposal was met with a preliminary NO followed by some clarifying questions.

Another huge amount of working hours and consultations with the FCI Head office, we managed in October to prepare a second proposal for resubmission to the GC, a proposal which in my view was much better designed than the first one. Most devastating, our second proposal was turned down too; however, this time without any further arguments or explanation from the GC.

That knock out left us and the Commission with the clear impression that the GC just does not care for us or the dogs. These sledge dog breeds along with the Samoyed and the Greenland Dog have been used for sledding for hundreds years and they are still used for their original purpose today all over the world.

We and the Commission are most devastated by this neglect and for us, the high ranked FCI motto "Fit for function" just seems as empty talk - a blow in the wind, if you like.

At this moment we just do not see how to continue our work and we might not have the courage to move on. Hopefully, 2022 opens for new views on the matter and for the Commission to have most delayed future meeting.

FCI COMMISSION FOR UTILITY DOGS - Activity report

Meetings

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs did not meet face to face, but twice via videoconference: the first meeting was on 13th of March 2021 and the second videoconference was held on the 11th of September 2021.

I want to thank all the delegates who attended and contributed to these meetings.

During these meetings, there were several proposals discussed by the Commission like:

- extra clarification was provided about the FCI circular 49-2020;
- there was also a proposal for a new FCI Championship for young dog handlers in Tracking.

This proposal was worked out and, during the second videoconference, the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs accepted the proposal for the organisation of a youth camp for young dog handlers in Tracking. In the proposal, there will be 2 groups: 14-17 years of age and 18-21 years of age.

During this youth camp, there will be several days with activities, where the young people can get to know each other and do things together. Although the dogs will have a central place during this camp, daily activities can be with or without dogs. At the end of this youth camp, the FCI Championship will be held. The FCI Championship will have the following levels:

FCI-IGP-FH-V
FCI-IGP-FH-1
FCI-IGP-FH-2

- During the second videoconference, it was decided to send a proposal to the FCI, to be approved by the General Committee, for the organisation of this FCI Youth Camp.
- During the first videoconference, it was suggested to create a working group for the future FCI IGP Regulations. In the second videoconference held on 11-09-2021, this working group was chosen. The task of this working group is to work out a proposal for the future FCI IGP, that will have a large support within the FCI members.

- During the first videoconference, the proposal to create a small group of experts for extra education for future Judges that will officiate at FCI World Championships was accepted by the Commission. In the second videoconference held on 11-09-2021, it was decided that this group will consist of Mr Robert Markschlaeger from Austria, Mr Igor Lengvarsky from Slovakia, Mr Clemente Grosso from Italy and Mr Mike Grueb from Switzerland.
- The Commission decided to re-establish the former "Judges list" for FCI international IGP Judges that are chosen by their NCO. Every FCI Member NCO will be asked to send in two Judges for each phase of the FCI-IGP World Championship and two Judges for the FCI IGP-FH World Championship. The NCO's need to send the name of their chosen Judges, together with their cynological C.V.

A proposal will be sent for approval to the FCI General Committee.

- A proposal will be made to adapt the FCI Specifications for the organisation of the FCI-IGP World Championship, as well as a proposal to adapt the Specifications for the organisation of the FCI World Championship for FCI-IGP-FH for Tracking Dogs.

Both proposals will be sent for approval to the FCI General Committee.

2021 FCI-World Championship FCI-IGP-FH for Tracking Dogs

The FCI-IGP-FH WC 2021 planned to be held in Finland was cancelled due to the Covid-19 situation at that time in Finland. We want to thank the Finish canine organisation and the organising committee for all the efforts they have done to be ready to hold this FCI World Championship.

Because the Covid-19 situation allowed to organise an FCI IGP-FH World Championship in the second part of 2021, the Hungarian canine organisation allowed the organisation of this 2021 FCI World Championship for Tracking Dogs. For this we are very grateful.

This year's FCI World Championship for FCI IGP-FH Tracking Dogs was held on 26-31 October in the Kincsem Lovaspark in Tapiosszentmarton, Hungary. Although the Hungarian canine organisation had a short time to prepare all necessary items to hold this FCI World Championship, it really managed to do so with a successful event.

Our big compliments for all the teams under the supervision of Geza Nagy, Andreas Benke and Imre Palffi.



Also a very special "thank you" to the tracklayers who did a very hard but good job, and also to the Supervisor Peter Lengvarsky from Slovakia and the two Judges Aivo Oblikas from Estonia and Erik S Ahrends from Denmark, who not only did an excellent job by judging as they did, but also walked a marathon and lost some weight during the days of the World Championship.



I also want to thank my personal translator Marta Laszko, who translated the Hungarian language into, for me, understandable English.

In total, there were 47 participants from 26 countries. The results on the very difficult terrains: 2 x Excellent, 11 x Very Good, 10 x good, 3 x Satisfactory and 21 x Insufficient.

The third place was won by Tomaz Rezonja from Slovenia, with his female Belgium Shepherd Malinois Erja Marshall Dogs, who scored 93 and 98, with a total of 191/200.

FCI COMMISSION FOR EDUCATION AND PUBLIC RELATIONS - Activity report

The annual online meeting of the FCI Commission for Education and Public Relations took place on 9 November 2021 with the presence of 11 delegates of the FCI member countries, the Commission Coordinator on behalf of the FCI General Committee Mrs. Carla Molinari and 1 guest.

The meeting started with the presentation of the annual report comprising the work done by the Commission in the year 2021. The following proposals were made to the FCI General Committee in summer 2021:

Communication

Background

The coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is profoundly affecting life around the globe having put social, psychological and economic pressures on individuals and organisations. As a result, organisations faced huge challenges while adapting the new ways of both internal and external communication and getting new skills and competences in order to ensure clear, consistent and credible communication. Due to restricted live interactions, the major flow of information is transmitted via informational technologies. Therefore, the importance of informational technologies tools to raise awareness, educate and share information has grown significantly. Social media as a tool facilitating communication, improving social participation and increasing knowledge has become one of the most popular means used by the general public. Quick access to the information and the possibility for users to share helps to get a fast and broad coverage of the audience, but at the same time it may cause threats to relevant organisations in case of incorrect presentation of information.

The FCI NCOs, among their other responsibilities, have the obligation to educate the audience on canine issues, share important information and promote animal welfare; therefore, communication via informational technologies makes an important part of their activities. Though some organisations have their local either internal or external experts helping them to

deal with the current situation, it is very likely that, due to the particularity of their activity and often content sensitivity, a lot of organisations face challenges in coping with these issues.

1. Proposal – social media communication

With regard to the above, the Commission proposed to draw up guidelines (manual) on how to communicate and use visuals on social media followed by a webinar to all FCI NCOs.

2. Proposal – crisis communication

Due to the increased activity of animal welfare organisations, the FCI NCOs from time to time have to deal with crises situations, which have not fallen down, both in frequency and aggression, during pandemic time. The only thing that has changed is the prevalence of communication tools NCOs use in reacting to various attacks. Therefore, the Commission proposed to develop crisis communication guidelines, possibly followed by A series of practical webinars to all FCI NCOs covering such topics as "Adopt Don't Buy", "Why is Breeds Banning Dangerous", "Are Breeds Health Issues Something that "Hits" all Specimens", etc.

3. Proposal – communication to the general public

A huge part of the activities of the FCI NCOs comprises raising awareness of common knowledge about dogs, their welfare and promoting pedigree dogs. Producing materials to serve this purpose is both time- and resource-consuming. Accordingly, the Commission proposed to develop a pool of such materials in the form of articles, video materials, visuals, etc., that could be used by all the FCI NCOs. There are already existing good practices and examples made by some countries, e.g. the Mexican canine organisation <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=vGckFmFSJjw>, the Argentinian canine organisation <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kalPhgkYMPQ> and some other countries. Supposedly it could be a useful source of information and ideas on how to increase a common



knowledge of the general public on pedigree dogs and their importance, the idea of dog shows and other competitions held under the FCI, among other topics, that often become the target of animal welfare organisations and therefore are discredited in the eyes of society.

PROPOSALS: education

Background

Breeders' education is an important part of the canine organisations' activities, as it is directly related to the quality of dogs bred, their welfare and the general image of dog breeders in the society. In 2020, the Commission conducted a survey on the educational activities carried out by the FCI NCOs. In the survey, 85% of the respondents said that breeders' education is a top priority for the educational strategy of their organisation. However, the discussion of the delegates during the meeting revealed that breeders' education varies significantly among the FCI countries in both form and content due to the national context, the resources of the organisation, etc. Though having one unified breeders' education programme for all the FCI countries does not seem to be a reasonable solution, it still remains the key aspect in the field of education for the FCI NCOs.

Proposal

Bearing in mind the cultural and linguistic variety among the FCI countries, the Commission proposed to offer curricula for breeders' education collected from FCI NCOs, leaving the implementation to the national organisations. The source of material could be the FCI NCOs already-working breeder education programmes and programmes offered by the FCI partners, e.g. ProActive by Royal Canin, etc. This is likely to be a great help for countries that are at the point of launching the breeders' education activities and a source of ideas to upgrade these programmes, for the countries that already have them.

Implementation

Upon the approval of the FCI General Committee of all or any of the proposals above, the Commission undertook to submit an elaborated implementation plan for every proposal.

The Commission also proposed, with minor modifications and broader accessibility to the FCI NCOs, to activate FCIShare!, which could perfectly serve the purpose of being a pool of all the information generated by the Commission, in cooperation with the FCI PR team, and collected from the FCI NCOs in relation with the proposals above, at the same time supporting the FCI NCOs to promote pedigree dogs and spread the FCI values worldwide.

The administrative scheme could be developed with reference to the FCI rules and procedures, and the best contribution of the FCI Commission of Education and Public Relations.

The comments of the FCI General Committee on previous proposals within the scope of education and public relations submitted by the Commission were discussed and further elaborated by the Commission Coordinator on behalf of the FCI General Committee, Mrs Molinari.

Further steps to be taken in order to continue productive work of the Commission were foreseen and proposals of the delegates were discussed and accepted. The decision regarding the date and venue of the next meeting of the Commission was postponed due to unclear COVID-19 situation.

On behalf of the Board of the FCI Commission for Education and Public Relations, I would like to thank all the delegates of the Commission for their work, commitment and fruitful discussions that we had during and in between the meetings of the FCI Commission for Education and Public Relations.

1. Over the course of the two days I was there, I audited the FCI's financial statements, which include the balance sheet to 31st December 2021, with a result amounting to 5,011,092.30 €, the profit and loss account, with a result amounting to (a loss) -148,232.18 € and the report on these latter, all corresponding to the financial year ending on the aforesaid date.

The General Committee is responsible for drawing up the organisation's financial statements, in accordance with the regulatory framework for financial information which is applicable to it and in such a way as to ensure that it provides an accurate picture of the FCI's assets, financial position and results.

It is my own responsibility to offer an opinion about the financial statements as a whole, based upon the work carried out in accordance with the applicable regulatory standards, and this requires an examination - carried out by means of selective tests - of the evidence provided to back up the financial statements and an assessment of whether its presentation, the accounting principles and criteria used and the estimates made are in accordance with the applicable regulatory framework for financial information.

2. OPINION

In my opinion, the financial statements for the 2021 financial year do, in all significant aspects, indeed provide an accurate picture of the assets and financial situation of the Fédération Cynologique Internationale on 31st December 2021 and the results of its operations relating to the financial year which ended on the aforesaid date.

AUDIT REPORT

To the Members of the Fédération Cynologique Internationale

Pursuant to the request by Mr De Clercq, Executive Director of the FCI, we submit our report in our capacities as external auditors.

The managing body is responsible for establishing financial statements, which provide an accurate image - according to the Belgian accounting regulations - as well as for organising the internal control which it considers necessary to issue financial statements exempt of material misstatements. It is our responsibility to express an opinion about these financial statements, based on our audit.

We audited the association's accounts for the fiscal year ending on 31/12/2021. This audit, drawn up based on the fundamental accounting principles issued by the *Institut des Experts-Comptables & Conseils Fiscaux (I.E.C.)*, includes all the samplings and checking procedures we considered appropriate in view of the circumstances. These professional standards request our inspection to be organised and carried out under the form of a review allowing to achieve reasonable assurance that the accounts do not include any significant inaccuracies on the basis of the Belgian legal and regulatory dispositions on the subject. On this framework, we collected evidence regarding the information and the amounts provided in the financial statements which we consider sufficient and appropriate to base our opinion. In addition, the persons in charge within your association, and especially the accountancy department, provided us with all the necessary explanations and documents, making our mission easy to complete.

Here are our conclusions:

In the framework of our examination, we could state that:

- The administrative organisation and the internal control are suitable for the size and scope of the association's activities.
- The accountancy is in compliance with the Belgian legal and regulatory dispositions regarding the non-profit organisations, international non-profit organisations and foundations.

In addition, neither did we detect, nor were we made aware of any operation concluded or decisions made in breach of the correspondent statutes or legislation.

We were not made aware of any event occurring after our controls, which would be likely to significantly impact the accounts and thus modify the present conclusions.

At the conclusion of our audit of the accounts, and in compliance with the above-mentioned standards, we acquired reasonable assurance that the accounting report ending on December 31st, 2021, whose total balance amounts to **5,011,092.30 €** and whose income statement ends in a loss of **148,232.18 €**, provides an accurate image of the assets, of the financial situation and of the association's result, according to the Belgian legal accountancy framework.

This report cannot be used for any other purpose and its distribution is limited to the purpose described in the above-mentioned engagement letter from the FCI Executive Director.

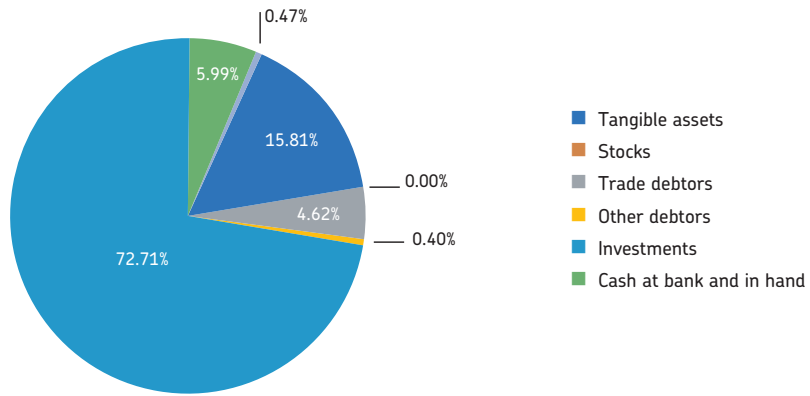

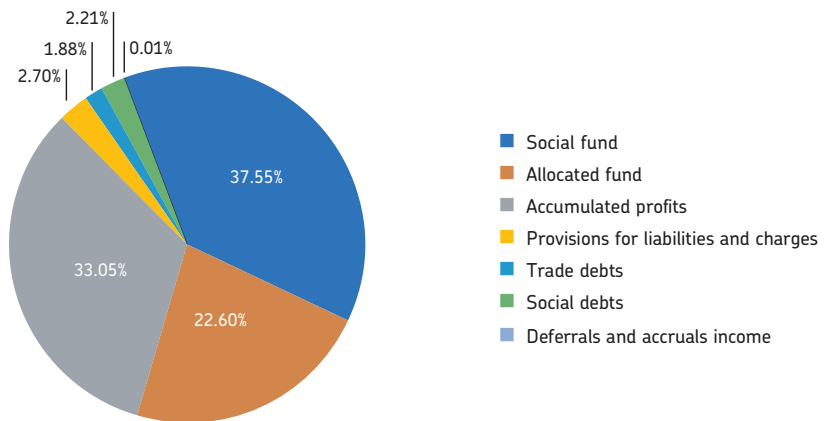

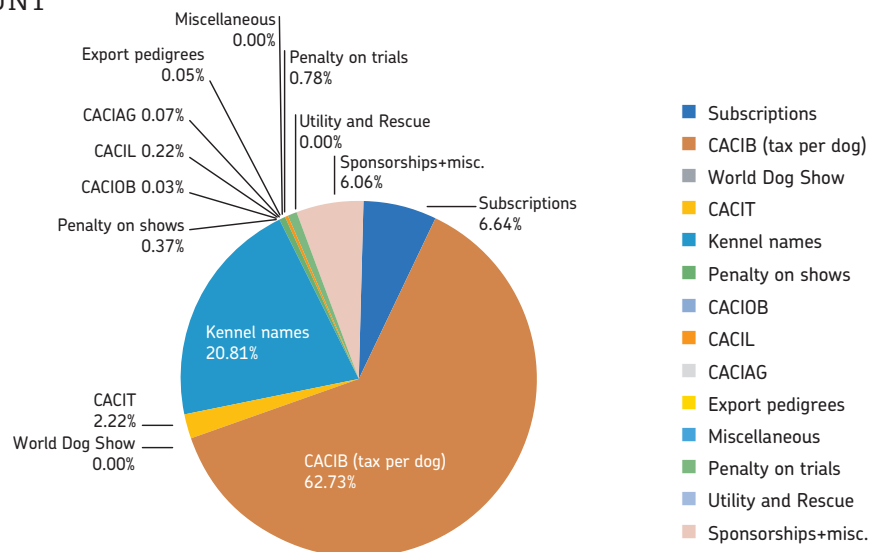

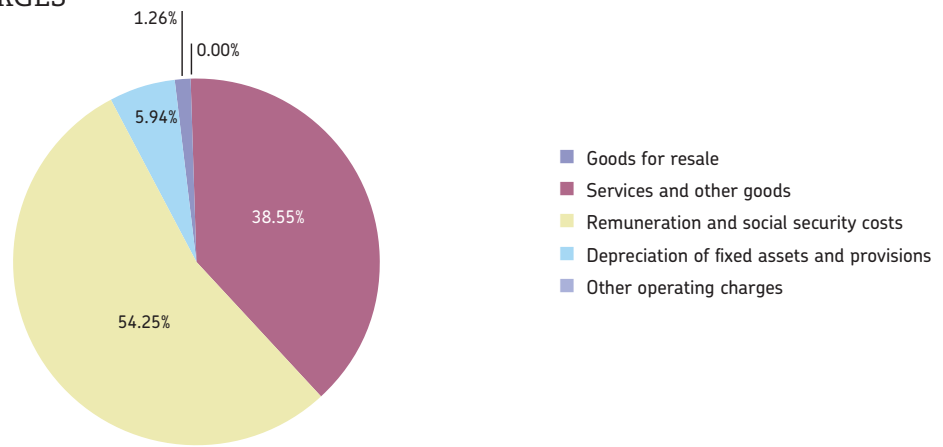

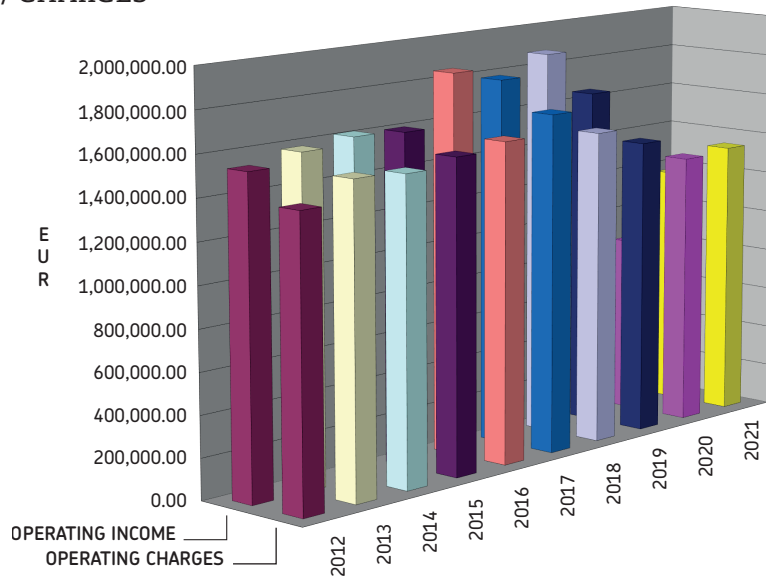
PROFIT AND LOSS ACCOUNT



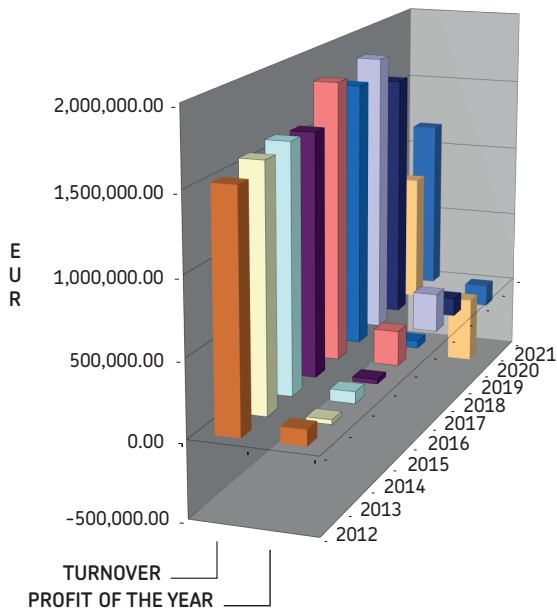
OPERATING CHARGES

Letter of Understanding between FCI and AKC

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and The American Kennel Club (AKC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting purebred dogs ; and

WHEREAS the parties hereto have in the past cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out this object and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose ; and

WHEREAS it is agreed that the relations between AKC and FCI and its member registries should be explicitly written with a view towards future cooperation ;

NOW, this letter of understanding encompasses the mutually agreed to basis for the relationship between the parties as follows :

1. AKC will recognize the pedigree for any FCI registry that meets AKC requirements and that wishes to have such recognition.
2. AKC will not automatically give exclusive recognition to the FCI registry in any country in which there are multiple registries and FCI will not automatically give exclusive recognition to AKC's registry in the United States.
3. AKC will not register any dog born in an FCI member country until that dog has been registered in the Stud Book of the FCI registry or the AKC-recognised registry in that country. No dog born in the USA, belonging to breeds recognised by the AKC, will be registered by an FCI member registry unless the dog has been registered in the FCI-recognised registry in the United States. It is up to the FCI to decide about the registration of dogs born in the USA belonging to breeds not recognised by the AKC.
4. Each of the parties agree that when any information comes to its knowledge which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (AKC judges suspension, amended standards, etc.), it will immediately communicate such information to the other party.
5. FCI and AKC will deal with the judging approval reciprocity in a separate document (see attachment).

6. AKC will not sponsor any event in the country of an FCI member without the express permission of FCI and the FCI member. FCI will not sponsor any event within the territory of the United States without the express permission of AKC. Puerto Rico is exempted from this provision as both AKC and FCI have been previously sponsoring activities on that island.
7. While not an FCI member, FCI has graciously agreed to permit AKC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, Obedience, etc. Championship Event provided that this participation does not prevent representative teams of FCI member organisations from taking part. If the AKC teams win the competition, they are not eligible for the title of FCI Winner at these events.
8. AKC registered dogs are eligible for the title of FCI International Champion under specific conditions to be agreed upon by the AKC and FCI.
9. Except with the agreement of the AKC, the FCI will not register kennel names for breeders living in USA (with exception of Puerto Rico) and, except with the agreement of the FCI, the AKC will not register kennel names for breeders living in countries where the FCI has a member, which the AKC has accepted.
10. FCI agrees to send to the AKC headquarters all revised breed standards and AKC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters copies of its Complete Dog Book, which includes all AKC standards, each time that such publication is revised.
11. The terms of this letter of understanding is agreed to by the parties listed below. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon reasonable notification to the other party.

Breed Judging

At FCI CACIB international shows, the AKC judges are eligible to judge and award the CACIB provided that the two following conditions are fulfilled:

1. the breeds they are scheduled to judge are recognised by the AKC (this does not include FSS and Miscellaneous classes).
2. the judges in question are allowed to judge, under AKC regulations, the breeds in question at AKC events and award them championship points. An AKC judge, residing in the United States, may not be approved as an FCI judge (breed, group, all breed) eligible to award CACIB.

At AKC events, the FCI judges are eligible to judge and award championship points provided that the following conditions are fulfilled:

1. the breeds they are scheduled to judge are recognised by the FCI and by the national kennel club, in their country of residence, which has jurisdiction over the judges in question
2. the judges are members of their national kennel club, in their country of residence, which is an FCI member or contract partner
3. the judges in question are allowed to judge, under FCI regulations, the breeds in question at FCI International CACIB shows and award them the CACIB

Group and BIS Judging

It is up to both, the AKC and the FCI members, to choose to invite or not a judge to judge a particular group (according to FCI or AKC breed nomenclature) at an AKC event or at an international FCI CACIB show taking into consideration the experience of the judge, his judging credentials and the breeds and their numbers in the groups to judge.

Letter of Understanding between the Fédération Cynologique Internationale and the Kennel Club

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and the Kennel Club (KC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting, in the case of the FCI, pedigree dogs and in the case of the Kennel Club, all dogs; and

WHEREAS the parties hereto have in the past cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out this object and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose; and

WHEREAS it is agreed that the relations between KC and FCI and its member registries should be explicitly written with a view towards future cooperation;

NOW, this letter of understanding encompasses the mutually agreed basis for the relationship between the parties as follows:

- 1. The KC, where it recognises the breed in question, will recognise the pedigree of any FCI registry that meets KC requirements and that wishes to have such recognition.**
- 2. In so far as it is lawful, the KC will give exclusive recognition to the FCI registry in any country in which there are multiple registries provided that these registries meet KC requirements and the FCI will give exclusive recognition to the KC's registry in the United Kingdom. For the time being this will not include Malta and China.**
- 3. The KC will not register any dog, or issue a pedigree to any dog, born in an FCI member country whose registry the KC recognises, until that dog has been registered in the FCI registry in that country. No dog born in the UK will be registered, or have a pedigree issued, by an FCI member registry unless the dog has been registered by the KC in the United Kingdom.**
- 4. Each of the parties agree that when any information comes to its knowledge which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (KC or FCI judges suspension, amended standards, etc.), it will immediately communicate such information to the other party.**
- 5. The FCI and the KC will endeavour to agree on the conditions to make their respective judges eligible to officiate at events sanctioned by them (FCI and KC).**
- 6. The KC will not sponsor or support any event for dogs in the country of a current FCI member without the express permission of the FCI member. The FCI will not sponsor or support any event for dogs within the territory of the United Kingdom without the express permission of the KC. For the time being this will not include Malta and China.**

7. While the KC is not an FCI member, the FCI has graciously agreed to permit the KC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, Obedience, etc. Championship Event provided that this participation does not prevent representative teams of FCI member organisations from taking part. The KC teams may win the competition but are not eligible for the title of FCI Winner at these events.
8. The FCI agrees to send to the KC headquarters all revised breed standards and the KC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters copies of all revised breed standards. The FCI and KC will discuss health issues connected with breed standards on a regular basis.
9. FCI members are allowed to refer to the title of UK Champion by using the abbreviation "UK Ch + name of the dog".
10. Except with the agreement of the KC, the FCI will not register kennel names of breeders living in the UK and, except with the agreement of the FCI, the KC will not register kennel names of breeders living in countries where the FCI has a member, which the KC has accepted.
11. The terms of this letter of understanding are agreed to by the parties listed below. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon reasonable notification to the other party.

**AGREEMENT ON THE MUTUAL RECOGNITION OF DOG SHOW JUDGES
BETWEEN THE KENNEL CLUB AND THE
FEDERATION CYNOLOGIQUE INTERNATIONALE**

This agreement refers only to the mutual recognition of judges, hereinafter referred to as 'FCI Judges' who are resident in a FCI member country and are listed as designated 'International Judges' in the Judges Directory published by the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI), to award Challenge Certificates and to judge Groups and Best in Show at Kennel Club licensed Championship Shows, and for UK resident judges to award Certificats d'Aptitude au Championnat International de Beauté (CACIBs) and to judge Groups and Best in Show at International FCI CACIB Shows held under the auspices of the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI). Furthermore, all other recognised canine activities such as competitive obedience, agility, field trials, working trials etc. are specifically excluded.

1. This agreement will commence on the 1st day of May in 2017 and will be valid for a period of not more than 5 years, subject to the right of termination by one or other of the parties, no less than six months prior to the date of expiry.
2. Subject to six months' notice, this agreement may be amended at any time by mutual agreement of the parties concerned.
3. This agreement is predicated on the basis that the Kennel Club (KC) and Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) have agreed to recognise and respect their respective schemes for the approval, education and training of dog show judges.

Approval to award Kennel Club Challenge Certificates

4. The Kennel Club will accept nominations for approval, in accordance with Kennel Club Rules and Regulations and appropriate Codes of Best Practice as published and amended from time to time, to award Challenge Certificates to a breed(s) for the first time, without requesting completion of a Kennel Club questionnaire, for FCI Judges resident in a FCI member country provided they are suitably experienced, having previously awarded CACIBs to the relevant breed(s) in countries other than their country of residence for a minimum period of 5 years prior to their first UK appointment for the breed(s).
5. All such nominations will continue to be subject to the approval of the Kennel Club's Board.

6. FCI Judges resident in a FCI member country who are approved to award Challenge Certificates to a breed for the first time on the basis of mutual recognition may be subject to evaluation when carrying out the appointment. Approval for subsequent appointments to award Challenge Certificates for the same breed will be subject both to the outcome of any evaluation and the proviso that the judge remains in good standing.

7. FCI Judges resident in a FCI member country who were previously approved to award Challenge Certificates at Kennel Club licensed Championship Shows prior to the signing of this agreement will continue to be considered for approval for subsequent appointments, subject to the proviso that they remain in good standing.

Approval to judge Groups and Best in Show at Kennel Club Licensed Championship Shows

8. FCI Judges resident in a FCI member country who were previously approved to judge Groups and Best in Show at Kennel Club licensed Championship Shows prior to the signing of this agreement will continue to be considered for subsequent appointments, subject to the proviso that they remain in good standing.

9. The criteria to be applied in the case of FCI Judges resident in a FCI member country who are nominated, subsequent to the signing of this agreement, to judge Groups and Best in Show for the first time at Kennel Club licensed Championship Shows will be the same as those applicable to UK resident judges.

10. All such nominations will continue to be subject to the approval of the Kennel Club's Board.

Approval to award Fédération Cynologique Internationale Certificat d'Aptitude au Championnat International de Beauté (CACIBs)

11. UK resident judges who remain in good standing and have previously awarded Challenge Certificates in the UK will be eligible to award CACIBs to the relevant breeds provided that they are suitably experienced.

Approval to judge Groups at International FCI CACIB Shows

12. UK resident judges who have previously been approved to award Challenge Certificates in 50% or more of the breeds that are allocated Challenge Certificates by the Kennel Club, in an FCI group, will be eligible to be approved to judge the relevant group at International FCI CACIB Shows, subject to the proviso that they remain in good standing.

13. UK resident judges who remain in good standing and were previously approved, prior to the signing of this agreement, to judge one or more Groups at International FCI CACIB Shows will continue to be recognised as approved to judge the relevant group(s).

Approval to judge Best in Show at International FCI CACIB Shows

14. UK resident judges who remain in good standing and have judged five or more FCI groups will be eligible to be approved to judge Best in Show at International FCI CACIB Shows.

15. UK resident judges who remain in good standing and were previously approved to judge Best in Show at International FCI CACIB Shows prior to the signing of this agreement will continue to be recognised by the FCI as approved to judge Best in Show.

Memorandum of Understanding between FCI and CKC

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and The Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting purebred dogs;

WHEREAS the CKC and the FCI have, in the past, cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out these goals and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose;

WHEREAS it is recognized that both the FCI and the CKC are required to operate within the limits of the legislation governing their activities, including their respective constitution and by-laws;

NOW this letter of understanding expresses a mutually agreed to basis for the relationship between the CKC and the FCI as follows:

1. The CKC acknowledges the role of the FCI and its governing institutions as set out in the FCI Statutes as the primary world federation of dog registries.
2. The FCI acknowledges the CKC as the primary kennel club in Canada.
3. The CKC and the FCI agree that when any information comes to the knowledge of one party, which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (judges suspension, amended standards etc.), it will immediately communicate, in writing, such information to the other party.
4. The parties will meet at the request of either of them, within a reasonable timeframe and on basis of a consistent mutually agreed agenda which will include matters of common interest.

5. The FCI agrees to send to the CKC head office a copy of all breed standards with revisions as they occur and CKC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters all CKC breed standards with revision as they occur. The FCI and CKC will also share information concerning the decisions of their respective governing bodies such as the exchange of official publications.
6. The CKC will periodically provide the FCI with a list of the registries from the FCI member countries with which the CKC has reached an agreement providing for the mutual recognition of studbooks and pedigrees. The CKC will get in touch with all the FCI members and contract partners and inform them about the procedure to follow to gain CKC recognition. The FCI will notify the CKC of the accession of any country to FCI membership.
7. The details of a mutual recognition of FCI and CKC judges are written on a document which is part of this contract.
8. The FCI will not sponsor or sanction any event within Canada without the express permission of the CKC.
9. The CKC will not sponsor or sanction any event in an FCI member country without the express permission of the FCI and the agreement of the member country.
10. While not an FCI member, FCI graciously agrees to permit CKC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, and Obedience Championship Events and any forthcoming canine performance event that may be mutually recognized by both organizations.
11. As long as no agreement is reached with regard to the working breeds (according to the FCI nomenclature) between the FCI and CKC, these breeds (CKC-registered dogs) are not eligible for the title of "International Beauty Champion". The non-working breeds (CKC-registered dogs) are eligible for this title provided that they comply with the FCI International Championship Regulations, i.e. 4 CACIB in 3 countries under 3 different FCI judges.
12. The CKC registered dogs are eligible for the other FCI international titles provided that they meet with the FCI requirements.
13. The FCI international directory of kennel names (affixes) is not open to CKC breeders and the FCI cannot guarantee that a CKC kennel name (affix) will not be similar to an FCI registered kennel name (affix) and conversely.

14. Both parties agree that the present Letter of Understanding shall not be interpreted or applied so as to require either party to act in a manner not authorized by or contrary to applicable legislation, including each party's constitution, rules or by-laws.
15. The terms of this Letter of Understanding are agreed to by both parties. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon giving the other party 60 days notice in writing.

CKC Judges eligibility to officiate at FCI International Events

From April 1st, 2009, the following dispositions will apply:

- a) CKC judges are allowed to judge in the FCI member countries all-breed, group and specialty national shows, the breeds they are approved to judge in Canada.
- b) CKC judges who have already judged international FCI CACIB shows before December 31st, 2007, are allowed to award CACIB at international FCI CACIB shows, FCI World and Sections shows, to the breeds they are approved to judge in Canada.
- c) Once a CKC judge has judged four (4) national shows in four (4) different FCI member countries by the FCI breed standards, he/she is allowed to award CACIB to the breeds he/she is approved to judge in Canada.

It will be the responsibility of the FCI Office and of the judges concerned to keep track of assignments undertaken in an FCI member country. Taking into account the legal restrictions on the exercise of extra-territorial jurisdiction by the CKC, it will be the responsibility of the CKC to communicate them to their judges and the practical implementation and enforcement of the agreed above principles will be under the responsibility of the FCI Office, of the FCI members and the judges concerned.
