## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Reaching end of December 2013 and having a close look back, we can state that the year 2013 was a busy one.

The General Committee met three times in Madrid - 27-28 February 2013, in Budapest - 12 and 15 May 2013 and Helsinki - 29-30 October 2013.

End 2013, following the elections held in Budapest, the General Committee comprises the following members: Rafael de Santiago (President from May 13<sup>th</sup>, 2013), Gerard Jipping (Vice-President from May 13<sup>th</sup>, 2013), Carla Molinari (Treasurer from May 13<sup>th</sup>, 2013), Dr Tamas Jakkel, Kari Järvinen, Stefan Stefik, Jorgen Hindse, Miguel Ángel Martínez, Augusto Benedicto Santos.

The Executive Committee met 3 times: Thuin (FCI Office) on 17-18 June 2013, Lisbon on 2-3-4 August 2013 and Jerez de la Frontera (ES) on 12-13 October 2013

The FCI General Committee and the Kennel Club announced that a frame of agreement regarding the mutual recognition of Kennel Club and FCI judges was reached following several months of detailed discussions.

This agreement is considered to be a major step forward which will enable judges from both organisations to bring their experience and expertise to the benefit of all the countries involved, and of course to the benefit of dogs.

The frame of agreement was signed by the FCI and the Kennel Club mid May in Budapest, Hungary. Details about

how to implement this frame of agreement into a "real" agreement are expected to be finalised in 2014.

Later in 2013, in November, a friendly meeting between the KC and two members of the General Committee (R. de Santiago and K. Järvinen) was organised, upon invitation of the KC.

A meeting is also planned between the FCI Executive Committee and the AKC and CKC at the latter's respective headquarters in January 2014 to discuss the mutual benefit of increased cooperation for a positive future for both organisations.

Passion for purebred dogs is at the heart of both the FCI and Eukanuba and in 2013, both organisations negotiated the continuation of their joint efforts with the renewal of their "Partners in Excellence" agreement. This remarkably successful collaboration began in 2006, and among its achievements has been the birth and rise of the Eukanuba World Challenge. A new 3-year "Partners in Excellence" agreement is planned to be signed in 2014.



The FCI General Committee expressed their warmest thanks to Mr Takemi Nagamura (JP) who sat in the FCI General Committee as representative of the FCI Asia and Pacific Section for 8 years. All through his mandate, Mr Nagamura acted for the benefit of dogs in the FCI and more particularly in the section that he chaired. He was a great colleague and we were honoured that we could work together for so many years. We wished him good luck for the future. We congratulated Mr Augusto Benedicto Santos III (PH) on his election as President of the FCI Asia and Pacific Section (General Assembly of the FCI Asia and the Pacific Section, Ootacamund, India, September 2013) and welcomed him in the FCI General Committee, looking forward to an excellent cooperation.

Please allow me to use this space to communicate two important remarks:

Before the FCI publishes any official statement, the General Committee investigates about the circumstances of the reported case by addressing the national canine organisation involved in the situation, as well as any other party involved.

The FCI urges its members to fulfil their complete authority and process any case of dog or animal abuse until the last consequences. Animal mistreatment does not represent the true spirit of the canine sports and cannot and will not be tolerated. The FCI General Committee urges the FCI members - the national kennel clubs - to take actions in any unacceptable situation where cruelty to dogs is witnessed.

**Plan for the future of the FCI**

With a little over a century of history behind it, the FCI has a very promising future. I believe in this future, I believe in the FCI and I feel sure that in our hearts we know that, for the FCI, the best is still to come.

We shall be forging commercial alliances which will provide the organisation with new revenue streams, such as the sale of advertising space on [www.fci.be](http://www.fci.be), and other marketing methods.

### Empowerment

We need to entrust our main commissions with the task of presenting and publishing investigative, historical and social work with the aim of becoming a global reference centre, with educational and investigative information, and taking full advantage of our global reach.

### Growth

We need to continue expanding our horizons and encourage more members to join our organisation, and to do this I shall be identifying countries in which the love of dogs is developing so that we can offer them our help in improving their organisations and also in order to benefit their dogs. However, we must also strengthen and back up our current members when they experience problems and support them in the struggles they face in their own countries. We must promote the growth of canine activities in all countries and support educational initiatives.

The FCI must look to the future beyond its worldwide presence, which means that we need to stimulate participation in our organisation by young people and young adults, which means that I shall be setting up a youth committee, which will be strictly in line with the aim of listening to and identifying any ideas, concerns and suggestions they may have which may be of benefit to the FCI.

Our commitment to dogs is and will remain unshakable, which means that the FCI will be watching over the well-being of dogs around the whole world. It will often be a hard road, but at the same time it is a very promising one. I feel sure that I can guide the FCI towards a road to a brilliant future. Let's do it together!

I could not end this report without expressing my warmest and most sincere thanks and congratulations to one of the most outstanding personalities of the FCI: Mr Hans Müller. He was our President for 30 years, he has brought the FCI to the level which it has today and he behaved as a leader and a friend for all of us during all these years. Thank you very much my friend Hans!

In accordance with the celebration of the 100 Anniversary of the Federation Cynologique Internationale, the General Committee of the FCI reviewed its Mission and Vision Statements and Values to maintain our leadership worldwide.

## Mission statement

The FEDERATION CYNOLOGIQUE INTERNATIONALE (FCI) is the supreme authority of the canine culture worldwide. The FCI is responsible for safeguarding canine health and international dog activities to enhance the relations between dogs and humans. Established in 1911 the FCI includes 89 members and contract partners (one member per country). Each member issues their own pedigrees and train highly qualified judges. The FCI makes sure that the pedigrees and judges are mutually recognized by all the FCI members, contract partners and any person involved in their domestic canine scene.

## Vision statement

The FCI supports, via its members and contract partners, the well-being of all dogs Worldwide.

## Values

- THE FCI cares about all dogs worldwide.
- THE FCI considers the health, temperament and behaviour as the most important matters in dogs and their Breed Standards.
- THE FCI promotes dog activities and dog sports worldwide, which it considers beneficial to the dogs.
- THE FCI entrusts its commissions to make recommendations about other important matters.
- THE FCI divides geographically the world of dogs through its five sections.
- THE FCI trusts its members and contract partners to protect the integrity of their National Registries.
- THE FCI recognizes and respects agreements with nonmember national organizations.
- THE FCI sets the highest standards for its headquarters.
- THE FCI ensures the regular celebration of World and Section Championship events.

## FCI SCIENTIFIC COMMISSION - Activity report

### Official Meeting

During the period under review, the Scientific Commission met on 21-22 March 2013 in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

On the first day of the meeting, the Scientific Commission discussed health and genetic issues raised either by the General Committee of the FCI or by the FCI member clubs. In addition, the commission initiated its own ideas and recommendations regarding topics relevant to health improvement of pure bred dogs

The second day was dedicated to joint discussions with the Standard Commission on items relevant to new standards, change in standards or health impairment due to standards and on the proposal of new regulations for the international recognition of new breeds.

### Recognition of New Breeds

The task of the Scientific Commission, in the process of the recognition of new breeds, is to investigate whether there are any severe anatomic or genetic impairments and to take care that the breeding basis of the new breeds is wide and diverse enough (8 family groups, previously denoted blood lines) to enable a healthy breeding.

Furthermore, to look whether the potential new breed is a new breed or is rather a variety of an already-recognised breed.

The New Breeds which the commission investigated during this period are the Prague Ratter (Prazsky Krysarik) and the Bohemian shepherd Dog (chodsky pes) .The

documents delivered by the Czech canine organisation were lacking some of the FCI requirements thus no further steps have been accomplished until the required information in its right form is received.

### Elbow Dysplasia

The international certificate for hip/elbow dysplasia was presented by Dr M. Durán. The certificate was discussed and the commission expressed their appreciation for the work done by Dr Durán with the late Prof Brass.

Decision of the Commission: Dr Durán will reformulate the certificate according to the comments expressed by the members of the commission. A separate certificate will be issued for Hips and for Elbow Dysplasia. The certificates will be used for international purposes within the FCI members, after the approval of the FCI General Committee.

### Abbreviations and list of Hereditary Diseases

Dr Andrés Villalobos prepared a comprehensive list of hereditary diseases and disorders in the dog, including their internationally recognised abbreviations, according to a previous request from the Commission.

This excellent list was been accepted by the Commission and later on by the General Committee.

The list will be further completed to its perfection and then issued as an FCI official publication.

### Meeting of the Presidents of the Standards and Scientific Commissions with the FCI General Committee, February 2013 in Madrid

The president of the Scientific Commission presented the commission proposals to be approved by the General Committee:

**List of Abbreviations:** it was approved and will be translated into the 4 official languages of the FCI.

**Dog Dentition:** the General Committee accepted that missing PM1 and M3 should not be a reason for disqualification in any breed, as it is an evolutionary trait and not a genetic failure.

**Experts Panels:** it was decided to establish FCI Health Experts Panels for the major hereditary diseases, namely Orthopedic screening programmes

Hereditary eye disorders

Hereditary heart diseases

## FCI STANDARDS COMMISSION - Activity report

At the General Assembly held in Budapest in May, three of the members were up for election: Hans Wiblishauser, re-elected; José Luis Payró, re-elected and our congratulations on their re-election. Jennifer Mulholland had one vote less than the new candidate, Claude Guintard from France. We thank Jennifer Mulholland for her valuable work in the Commission and welcome Claude Guintard.

The Commission's former president, Mr Raymond Triquet is much appreciated as the Commission's senior adviser, a position he has held since 2007 when he resigned from the full membership.

The presidents of the Standards- and Scientific Commissions were invited to the General Committee meeting in Madrid in February. An earlier proposal in co-operation with the Breeding Commission was presented. The proposed sentence, **"Only clinically and functionally healthy dogs with breed typical conformation should be used for breeding"** was approved by the GC and all standards will be amended with this now obligatory text under the heading of Nota Bene. This is published (circular 19/13) in the FCI Model standard.

It was pointed out that the standard of the German Shepherd Dog still states Hip Dysplasia as a disqualifying fault. The General Committee agrees to delete the HD as a disqualifying fault as this cannot be assessed by the human eye.

### Commission meeting in Buenos Aires

The Commission's annual meeting took place in Buenos Aires where the few of us able to attend was once again given superior hospitality by the Argentinian canine organisation. Although several of our members could not attend, the agenda was followed as it was pre-worked also by the absent members, hence the meeting was carried out with most issues decided on.

### Model standard

The FCI Model standard is a 'living' document where additions are made when believed necessary. Many standards were written decades ago. In modern times, both knowledge and a more scientific approach have succeeded, hence many standards need to be revised and updated and the Model standard is a guideline to that work. There is a need for standards to be easily understood by everyone, which do not ask for features that can jeopardise the health and soundness in the dog and that is kept in a recognisable FCI format and free

from scientific jargon etc. This is an important part of the information in the Model standard that should be regarded as a worksheet.

The important additions made in Buenos Aires, and agreed by both the Standards- & the Scientific Commissions, were approved by the General Committee at their meeting in Helsinki in October 2013. The circular is shortly to be published.

### Amended and new standards

The Commission amended the standards of Puli (now again accepting the grey colour); Swedish Vallhund and Large Münsterländer (now accepting all black coat colour). Some six standards were returned to the countries of origin by the GC. It was recommended to make them more user-friendly with genetically correct coat colours and less metrics and scientific jargon.

Perro (sin pelo) del Perú and Xoloitzcuintle (no more to be called Mexican hairless) were approved in 2012 (now accepted at shows also with the coated variety). The Peruvian breed standard is now published. The breed name remains with 'sin pelo', hairless as the breed is regarded in the national hereditary act with that name. The standard of the Xolo will be published when all translations are carried out.

### New breeds

The Commission had received some applications for new breeds where all requirements had not been met. Hence none were presented at the General Assembly. Some of the breeds had not had their standards finalised and others had not the required number of different bloodlines, some were not showing an adequate genetic diversity or an acceptable health picture.

The Commission took into consideration the combined recommendations made at the 1<sup>st</sup> International Workshop on Enhancement on Genetic Health in Purebred Dogs (Stockholm 2012) where the Workshop was held as a post-conference to the 6<sup>th</sup> International Conference on Advances in Canine and Feline Genomics and Inherited Diseases. The results was reported in the Commission's annual report 2012.

The rules for accepting new breeds are fairly old so have been revised and a proposal to the GC was made in Buenos Aires by both Commissions. The proposal was viewed by the GC in Helsinki, and after some minor changes was approved.

### Illustrations in standards

The Commission is, as are members of the GC, concerned about the illustrations on the front cover often lacking in quality. It is a difficult task, as the countries do not always take lightly the critique from the Commission. The Standards Commission has the responsibility to chose and to accept illustrations. Even though the illustrations are never said to be the perfect specimen, they should illustrate correct proportions, typical head, correct anatomy, coat and colour.



It is a known fact that a quality illustration (or photograph), when shown to five experts - three will disagree on the quality. Shown to five new experts – and they will disagree with the choice that the first five approved! Like in judging dogs – it is subjective. Hence there is no single solution, but the Commission sincerely hope that the collaboration should result in as typical illustrations as it is ever possible.

### Cross breeding between varieties

Both Commissions signed a proposal in Buenos Aires in March 2013 to the GC with clarified suggestions about how to handle the procedure. The GC decided at their meeting in Helsinki, October 13<sup>th</sup> to forward the matter to the General Assembly in 2015.

## FCI AGILITY COMMISSION – Activity report

In 2013, we had only one meeting with the delegates of those national canine organisations holding membership in the Commission. Usually, we have two meetings, both held at the place of the World Championship. Some years ago, the majority of the delegates decided to hold the World Championship 2013 - for the first time in the history of the dog sport - outside from Europe, in another continent: Johannesburg (South Africa).

It was already clear at the meeting in October 2012 that the Agility Commission would not hold two meetings in Johannesburg; the majority of the delegates decided not to hold the February meeting there, due to the high travel costs. The delegate of the French canine organisation then offered to be the host of the meeting.

So the meeting was held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> of February at the building of the Société Centrale Canine in Paris. 35 canine organisations had confirmed their attendance and named delegates, but only 19 delegates attended the Paris' meeting.

This meeting was a two-day, real work meeting, with a lot of debates, resolutions about the interpretation of rules and necessary amendments for the JEO and EO, the necessity of guidelines for Agility obstacles and final information about the events in 2013 JEO (host: Switzerland), EO (host: Belgium) and WC (host: South Africa).

It was decided to send an application to the FCI General Committee for the organisation of an international judges' workshop in 2014, where the national canine organisations

will be offered to send two of their international FCI judges. The contents of this workshop would be interpretation of the valid trial rules, course design; reviews would also be discussed particularly in relation with judging refusals and disqualifications. This workshop should help to harmonise the judging worldwide.

350 youth starters from 23 nations participated in the JEO in Wichtrach (CH). This was the highest number of starters ever, which shows that this event is getting more and more interest. Unfortunately during this event a dog died during the course running in the tunnel. The accident was not due to incorrect course design or incorrect equipment, but to a problem with the blood circulation of the dog. The SKG and the organising club deplored the tragic death very much, but upon the owner's request and after confirmation from the FCI supervisor, Paolo Meroni, the event continued after a short break.

The EO was held in Neeroteren (Belgium). About 800 participants from 33 nations broke all previous records. This high turn-out was probably due to the fact that most of the nations had decided not to send a team to the WC 2013 in South Africa. The organiser of the EO were facing a huge task, but they managed it perfectly. The list of winners and all other results can be found at <http://european-open-2013.jimdo.com>

The World Championship in South Africa was prepared over several years and has been superbly supported by the South African canine organisation KUSA; it took place in a very nice hall.

It was a big pity that only a total number of 8 nations sent their teams to this World Championship. We missed big Agility nations like France, Finland, Sweden and the founding country of the sport, United Kingdom and also the organising team of this year's World Championship. Except UK, all other countries had already hosted several WC and were proud to participate in the event with teams from other continents, to which they had been hosts.

Up to the deadline for entries, the host of the WC 2013 and myself hoped to have about 100 participants, but unfortunately there were only a total of only 70 starters. It was an overall very emotional event, all nations were close to each other, helped each other and everyone recognised the results other nations reached. It was an historical event with a special atmosphere.

It was not possible to hold the second meeting of the Commission in Johannesburg; after asking the 35 canine organisations, I got a positive answer from 8, all other let

me know that they would not be present. We agreed with the FCI office not to hold a second meeting, because it is not suitable that 8 delegates find resolutions and apply the FCI board for final decisions on behalf of all the 35 countries.

Shortly before the end of the year 2013 it was possible to get in touch with The Kennel Club (UK) for a possible mutual recognition of Agility judges between the FCI and The Kennel Club (UK). This initiative was supported by the FCI.

I would like to thank my board members, all the members of the working groups and the delegates for their cooperation.

In these thanks I would like to include the members of the FCI General Committee and the employees of the FCI office.

## FCI BREEDING COMMISSION - Activity report



The annual meeting of the Breeding Commission was arranged in Helsinki, June 8th, with excellent hospitality of the Finnish Kennel Club.

Representatives from the following member countries were present at the meeting: Austria (Mrs Heliane Maissen-Jarisch), Belgium (Mr Roger van Hoenacker), Finland (Dr Kirsi Sainio), France (Dr Frédéric Maison), Italy (Ms Maria Ceccarelli), Latvia (Ms Baiba Rumba), Luxembourg (Mr Nicolas Schwab), Norway (Dr Astrid Indrebø), Portugal (Mr Luís Gorjão Henriques), Slovenia (Mrs Marija Kavcic), Slovakia (Mrs Nora Takacova) and Sweden (Ms Britt-Marie Dornell).

### Breed-specific breeding strategies

Several important issues were discussed at the meeting. Among them was Breed Specific Breeding Strategies. Britt-Marie Dornell gave an excellent presentation of the situation in Sweden, where the breed clubs have been responsible for working out such strategies for their own breed(s), based on the breeding policy and Code of Ethics of the Swedish Kennel Club (SKK). Here is a short summary of her presentation:

"The project started in 2001. In earlier days a breeder's career was often life long, but today it is often much shorter. There is a need for long-term breeding strategies set by the breed club. The breed clubs have an overall breed responsibility; the breeders themselves are responsible of their breeding plans. Breed Specific Breeding Strategies (RAS) is a joint agreement pointing more to a direction

than the need of rules and regulations. It's important to keep the power of initiative! RAS is a way to secure quality in dog breeding, and the clubs have done a tremendous job. SKK has now accomplished to produce RAS for every breed in Sweden.

The RAS template includes population, genetic diversity, health, mentality and function as well as conformation. It includes breed history, description of the present situation and aims and strategies for the future. It is confirmed by SKK, and a report is written. Support is given by supervisors engaged by SKK, breeding committee, breeding consultants as well as breed club officials.

RAS is a living document, with a follow up every year, a revision every 5<sup>th</sup> year, firmly established among members. The future of RAS is evaluation and progress of health programmes, education at different levels, research and international collaboration."

It is of great value that the kennel clubs inform each other – and get ideas and inspiration from each other. France has started a similar project on the initiative of the breed clubs. Finland has been working with RAS from the same model as SKK for some years, and Norway started a similar RAS project based on the Swedish model last year.

**Proposal to the FCI General Secretariat:** *FCI should encourage every member and contract partner to make breed-specific breeding strategies in cooperation with the breed clubs. Information about the SKK RAS-project and other similar national projects should be available on the FCI Web page or on the platform suggested by the FCI Working Group 2012: The FCI Dog Health, Well-Being and Welfare Initiative.*

### Breeds with individuals which are genetically impossible to avoid in order to breed what is accepted in the breed standard

As a result from a proposal from the Breeding Commission last year, the General Committee asked the commission to make a complete list of the breeds concerned.

*Decision: the commission agreed on the following list to be **equally recognised** in the breed standard:*

- Ridgeless dogs in breeds where only ridge is accepted in the standard
  - Rhodesian ridgeback
  - Thai ridgeback
- Coated type in breeds where only naked dogs are accepted
  - Peruvian hairless dog

The breed standard is being changed, and will follow the same principles as the Mexican Hairless standard concerning the coated type. But will it be equally recognised?
- Merle in breeds where harlequin is accepted
  - Great Dane – Germany is now changing the breed standard

### Registration of imported dogs that would have been registered with limited registration (not allowed for breeding) if they were born in the country to where they are imported

**Proposal to the General Committee:** *Standing Orders, art 5.2 should be changed to (the suggested addition to the text is in bold and underlined characters): Any member or contract partner can refuse to (re)-register in its studbook, **or register with limited registration not to be used for breeding**, a dog suffering from hereditary defects or featuring defects which go against Art 2 in the Statutes or a dog which does not comply with the rules of selection defined by the member or contract partner in question.*

#### Background

Some national canine organisations register dogs with a limited registration (not to be used for breeding) due to e.g. increased risk for diseases or for diseased offspring, disqualifying coat colour (like two-coloured poodles) or to prevent matador breeding. According to the FCI rules (Standing Orders, art. 8.2), *a member or contract partner can refuse to (re)-register in its studbook a dog suffering from hereditary defects or featuring defects which go against Art 2 in the Statutes or a dog which does not comply with the rules of selection defined by the member or contract partner in question.*

The following questions were discussed: Are the kennel clubs allowed to register an imported dog with limited registration, according to Standing Orders 8.2, even though it has a normal registration (without limitation) from the export country? Or are the national canine organisations only allowed to refuse registration of the dog?

How do we register imported dogs that are registered without limitations in the country from where they are imported, but would have limited registration if they were born in our country? Does the Standing Orders allow us to register these dogs with limited registration (not to be used for breeding) due to our national rules?

Some examples:

- Some national canine organisations register e.g. two-coloured poodles, white boxers etc, with a limited registration. In accordance with FCI International Breeding Rules, Art 18, *all litters are to be fully registered at the same time; this includes all puppies reared to the date of application for registration.* This implies that it is not allowed to refuse registration of puppies with disqualifying coat colour born in a litter with accepted colours.
- Can an imported e.g. two-coloured poodle with a full registration from the export country be registered with a limited registration?
- If one (or both) parents have severe hip dysplasia or elbow dysplasia, offspring in some countries are registered with limited registration. If a dog from parents with severe HD/ED is imported, can it then be registered with limited registration?
- Some national canine organisations issue pedigrees with limited registration on offspring if the stud dog has more than a certain number of offspring/litters (and some national canine organisations refuse to register these puppies). If the stud dog has puppies in another country after exceeding the number of puppies/litters and these puppies are imported to the country where his puppies would have been registered with limited registration, is the recipient country allowed to register the dog with limited registration?

### Registration of two-coloured poodles

**Proposal to the General Committee:** *the parent organisation of the breed standard cannot instruct FCI members and contract partners not to register dogs with disqualifying colours.*

#### Background

FCI circular 49/2012: *At the request of the Société Centrale Canine pour l'Amélioration des Races de Chiens en France (SCC), parent organisation of the breed standard "Caniche" (Poodle, standard 172), the FCI members and contract partners are reminded that two-coloured poodle-related dogs can under no circumstances be called "Poodle" neither on pedigrees nor in show catalogues and in other official documents.*

The Breeding Commission wants to point out that the parent organisation of the breed standard can define e.g. disqualifying colours in the breed standard, but they cannot instruct FCI members and contract partners not to register dogs with disqualifying colours.





In accordance to FCI International Breeding Rules, Art 18, *all litters are to be fully registered at the same time; this includes all puppies reared to the date of application for registration.* This implies that it is not allowed to refuse registration of puppies with disqualifying coat colour born in a litter with accepted colours.

### The use of FCI-approved kennel names

The following addition to the FCI Standing Orders was approved by the General Assembly in 2013, based on the proposal from Breeding Commission in 2011 and the General Committee in 2011:

***A national canine organisation can add the FCI-registered kennel name on the pedigrees if the breed in question is recognised by the national canine organisation issuing the pedigree and/or by the FCI.***

The Breeding Commission discussed the matter again on their 2012 meeting, and agreed that this does not cover the main point of our proposal, which is that an FCI kennel name should **not** be allowed to be used on unrecognised “breeds”, like sc designer dogs. Some of these unrecognised breeds might have sc breed clubs with their own register, and we were told that some breeders use FCI-recognised kennel names in this register – and/or when they announce their puppies for sale. The Breeding Commission therefore made a new proposal to the General Committee based on the discussion in our 2012 meeting:

**Proposal to the General Committee:** *FCI-approved kennel names should only be used on litters registered in the stud book of the national kennel organisations. This point should be stated in the agreement signed by the breeder applying for the FCI Kennel Name.*

### Kennel name – prefix or suffix

FCI do not mention in the breeding rules if a kennel name (affix) can be used as prefix and/or suffix, and wanted to discuss the matter.

**Proposal to the General Committee:** The Breeding Commission suggests the following to be added to the Standing Orders (the new text is underlined):

#### Article 9.1, Standing Orders:

All members must apply to the FCI Secretariat General for the registration of new kennel names in the International FCI Kennel Name Register. The official application must indicate clearly whether the kennel name is to be used, permanently and for every single puppy, as a prefix or as a suffix.

**Article 9.4.c** (the current art 9.4.c will then be 9.4.d etc.): The kennel name is to be used only on litters registered in the stud book of the national kennel club, and always either as a prefix or as a suffix in accordance with the breeders application for the kennel name.

## FCI COMMISSION FOR BRITISH POINTERS - Activity report

The meeting of the FCI Commission for British Pointers was held in Tessaloniki (Greece) on February 24<sup>th</sup>, 2013 to discuss the topics on the agenda.

The session opened with the welcome of the President. Then, the committee began to analyse the different matters.

The committee unanimously approved the minutes of the previous meeting held in Nis (Serbia) on March 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2013.

Then, the committee discussed the progress of the European Cup in Greece, with particular attention to the grounds, the quality and density of partridges.

All the members expressed their congratulations to the Greek canine organisation for the excellent logistics put in place.

The committee then moved on to the fifth item on the agenda which concerned the assignment of Judges for the European Cup 2014 which, due to a rotation system, will be held in Spain. According to the principle applied for many years, almost one of the wringers should belong to one of the founding countries.

All the members agreed on the proposal about the calendar 2014 for international tests on grey partridges (point sixth), that is:

- from 1/2 to 14/2 in Spain
- from 15/2 to 28/2 in Greece
- from 1/3 to 25/3 in Serbia
- from 26/3 to 14/4 in France
- from 15/4 to 30/4 in Belgium

The final dates are however confirmed by the committee each year for the next one.

The seventh point was of considerable importance as Mr Bahlke, after checking the Regulation of the European Cup, had considered necessary to make some changes. Therefore, he suggested to establish a committee composed of three persons with the aim to study and suggest corrections; these suggestions will be discussed during the meeting in Spain.

In particular, the committee will discuss the following matters:

- Rules of the European Cup;
- Morphological tests during the Cup;
- Unrolling of the Cup with one or two juries;
- International Rules for English Pointing Dogs to be proposed to FCI.

The last point was related to the unrolling of Breeds Championships: whether together with the Cup or separately.

Initially, it had been decided to make them separately and specifically, in 2014, the European Cup in Spain and the other championships in France.

Afterwards, following the requests of some nations, Italy included, the decision was to organise the championships in the same nation as the Cup. The main reason that led to this conclusion has to be found in the economic crisis that has affected all the countries and which makes necessary to optimise the transfers of the competitors.

The situation however will be reviewed each year and the decisions will be taken according to the calendar.

We had our annual meeting the day before the European Cup in hotel Ambassador in Nis (Serbia), on March 23<sup>rd</sup> 2013.

17 countries attended this meeting, which was a good and interesting one, with serious discussions especially about the rules of the different countries. The European Cup will be held next year in La Tollara (Italy), with judges from Serbia, France, Portugal and Sweden.

The presentation of the teams was in the beautiful old centre of Nis.

17 teams were participating and 58 dogs would compete on the next day for the European Cup for Continental Pointers.

The 24<sup>th</sup> European Cup was organised in the beautiful fields around Nis, which were perfect for this kind of trial. This area has a lot of natural grey partridges.

The Cup was held in 4 batteries with judges from Croatia, Italy, Poland and Norway.

There was a barrage between the winners of the 4 batteries. The winners all had a first excellent, all without CAC so there was unfortunately no CACIT.

## FCI EARTH DOGS COMMISSION - Activity report

With cynology having so many different facets, it comes as no surprise that opinions are often very divergent. This is to be seen within the FCI and the Earth Dogs Commission, as well as in the different national laws regarding the keeping and training of dogs and in hunting regulations. It also comes as no surprise that national breed clubs and their kennel clubs put their own interests first. The FCI and its Earth Dogs Commission have the duty however of putting their main focus on upholding breed standards and making sure that dogs perform to these standards. Yet what are we now seeing? Certain kennel club delegates representing Dachshunds (FCI Standard No. 148) and German Hunting Terriers (FCI Standard No. 103) - breeds whose FCI standard descriptions

underline their hunting characteristics (under the heading "Brief historical summary") - now want to have certain admission requirements removed from the FCI CACIT trial regulations on account of national hunting regulations or a lack of suitable game. Yet proof of the spurlaut when tracking hares and the ability to work a fox or badger underground are essential elements of any Dachshund or German Hunting Terrier test. Neither profit-oriented financial aspects nor national laws can be allowed to influence the desired innate characteristics of our four-legged hunting friends. Where would the FCI be, should national circumstances such as laws or game availability no longer require small hunting dogs ("Bracken") to scent and chase game (the German "brackieren"), pointers to point game birds, flushing dogs to flush out game, retrievers to retrieve shot game or sighthounds to course, as proof for gaining an FCI working title? It is of utmost importance to do everything to maintain the hunting characteristics of all hunting dog breeds covered by the FCI. The "day of reckoning" will soon come when a fundamental decision will have to be taken. The FCI General Committee is responsible for ensuring the future of the hunting characteristics of our hunting dog breeds.

The European Cup Trials for Dachshunds were held in Germany on 4 - 6 October 2013, with the FCI "InterVGP" trial regulations being used for the second time. Of the 15 teams entered, eight finally took to the field, doing their best to meet the high requirements. The eight teams came from Austria, Belgium, the Czech Republic, Holland and Italy. Four teams successfully completed the trials, with both the four handlers and the four dogs - *gentlemen, take heed* - belonging to the "fairer sex"! The overall winner of these demanding trials, a team from Austria,

achieved the coveted CACIT (necessary for the FCI title of International Working Champion).

30 August - 1 September 2013 saw the "Grand Prix for Earth Dogs" (GPE) taking place in Thuringia (Germany) for the second time. 11 teckel teams and one hunting terrier team from Austria, Belgium, the Czech Republic, Germany, the Netherlands and Switzerland did their best to fulfil the high requirements, with seven teams successfully completing the trials. A team from the Czech Republic was the overall winner. Three teams achieved scores making

them eligible to gain the CACIT, whereby it was good to see the German Hunting Terrier bitch among the CACIT winners.

Further tasks await us. The 2014 meeting, scheduled to be held in Dresden, is set to show us the way forwards.

## FCI SHOW COMMISSION – Activity report

The Colombian canine organisation hosted the FCI Show Commission's annual meeting first weekend in February together with the FCI Show Judges Commission. This was the first time this meeting was held outside Europe. The commission has during the last five years worked on the revision of the FCI Regulations for Dog Shows which was accepted by the FCI General Committee and made valid from 1.1.2013. In the process of working with the new regulations where delegates from two different South American and one Asian Country took active part, it became obvious that the cultural variety in the vast number of FCI countries is a major problem when discussing and trying to agree on regulations that shall include all countries in the organisation. The ambition of accepting the Colombian canine organisation's wish to host our annual meeting was to bring the discussions closer to the South American member countries and we had hoped that much more of the member countries from this region would have taken the opportunity to express their views on the commission's work. As it turned out it was still only delegates from Colombia and Uruguay that attended the meeting.

The Colombian canine organisation was a perfect host and in addition to very constructive discussions which

ended in many proposals from the two commissions to the FCI General Committee, the delegates had a wonderful time in the historical city of Cartagena and also had the opportunity to enjoy a memorable day on a Caribbean island.

We expect that dog people traveling around the world to attend dog shows really love their dogs and are concerned about their health and welfare. It is still common for dog shows organisers during summertime that dogs are left to suffer in warm cars, in some cases dogs have also been found dead in overheated cars. To try and make exhibitors more responsible, the commission made the following proposal to the FCI General Committee:

**Proposal:** Ask FCI to send a circular to all national canine organisations to put following wording in front of the show catalogue for all to read:

*The exhibitors are responsible for safeguarding the welfare of the dog at a dog show. It is forbidden to expose the dog for a situation that can be dangerous for the health and welfare of the dog, such as leaving a dog in the car in hot or cold weather and/or treating the dog in a cruel manner.*

*Violation of these rules will result in exclusion from the current and future dog shows.*

**The proposal was accepted by the FCI General Committee in their October meeting.**

The Show Commission both at its meeting in 2011 and 2012 discussed the matter of FCI member countries awarding national CACs at shows held in another member country. At the FCI General Assembly 2013 it was decided to follow the proposal from the FCI Show Commission:

**New proposed wording in the FCI Standing Orders:**

Only international all-breed shows and international trials at which FCI awards (CACIB, CACIT, CACIAG, CACIL, CACIOB) are granted come under the aegis of the FCI. All documents and catalogues related to the above events must carry the FCI logo. The FCI logo must also be visible at all these events.

**No CAC title/certificate can be given by an FCI member / contract partner on the occasion of shows held on the territory of another FCI member / contract partner.**

There has been good communication with the FCI General Secretariat in Thuin during the year, and some questions brought forward by the office have been solved during the year with communication by mail. These questions have been related to understanding of the regulations.

As the number of member countries attending our commission meeting steadily increases, the commission experience that the FCI General Committee consider our proposals in a very serious and positive manner which results in most of our proposals being accepted.

Our dog shows and dog breeding are a constant concern in the press and public opinion, but with the FCI making international regulations for shows, dog judges, breeding, ethics, all concentrating on health and soundness as very important, and if all countries try to act according to the different regulations, I believe that we can be enjoying our fabulous hobby for years to come.

## FCI COMMISSION FOR HERDING DOGS – Activity report



Herding working test and trial are open to sheep and cattle dogs of FCI groups 1, 2, 5. Sheepdog trials promote good handling of the sheep with a minimum of stress for them, as well as good handling of the sheepdog, to promote its will and working ability to secure and select the best working lines and to preserve the correct breeding of herding dogs.

In the past years the commission has drafted regulations for international trials. **Collecting style** for Border Collies and Kelpies, which follows fixed courses, and **traditional style** open to all other herding breeds with courses, which require more alternatives and follows the daily work of a Shepherd.

The regulations are recognised by the FCI and were published on the FCI website. At international trials the CACITR will be gained, which allows to obtain the title (CITR), Champion International de Troupeau.

Only some of the FCI member countries have recognised the regulations and published the international sheepdog regulations and (or) drafted similar national regulations.

The international situation concerning Border Collies is rather difficult as the UK Border Collies that work as herding dogs are registered in the ISDS studbook and also the trials are organised under the control of the ISDS.

The commission expects some help from the FCI to support the working sheepdog, to make it grow and develop in more member countries under the FCI. Also in traditional style the availability of judges with experience is very limited and the discipline needs expert judges with good knowledge and training. The commission plans to organise meetings to be able to recruit more judges.

The commission had their meeting in October 2013 in Talheim (Germany). The number of members of the FCI Commission for Herding Dogs is 18, but there were only 8 attending the meeting in Talheim.

The next meeting will be held in September/October in Finland.

## FCI OBEDIENCE COMMISSION - Activity report



The highlight of our obedience sport in year 2013 was the World Winner competition in Obedience in Budapest, Hungary. The competition was held in connection with the World Dog Show. Fifteen nations had sent a full team of six competitors to contest for the world championship. There was a full number of entries, 100 altogether. Hungary had sent a competitor for the first time.

## FCI COMMISSION FOR RESCUE DOGS – Activity report

### Meeting

One meeting was held in 2013 (2-3 March in Paris, France), with delegates from the FCI countries taking part.

The agenda of the August 26th meeting included the following:

- Review of the 2012 FCI World Championship for Rescue Dog Teams in the Czech Republic.
- The pool of international judges for FCI World Championships for Rescue Dog Teams.
- Preview of the FCI 2014 World Championship for Rescue Dog Teams in Italy.
- Amendments to the current trial regulations.
- A proposal to raise the daily allowance of rescue dog judges (from EUR 35 a day to EUR 50).
- A proposal to raise the km allowance (from EUR 0.35/km to EUR 0.50).
- A proposal to introduce an FCI European Open for Rescue Dog Teams. This event would take place once every two years, in those years when there are no World Championships for Rescue Dogs Teams.

### 2013 FCI international judges' seminar

2013 saw the FCI Commission for Rescue Dogs, in conjunction with the IRO, holding the 2013 seminar for FCI and IRO rescue dog judges in Berlin, Germany. This seminar is designed to update judges' skills and help them achieve a uniform level of assessment.

The most important event in 2013 was the International Working Test (IWT) organised in Germany.

On the 6<sup>th</sup> and the 7<sup>th</sup> of July, the 22<sup>nd</sup> IWT was organised near Kleve at Castle Moyland. Permission to use the superb grounds was granted by the family von Steengracht. Gamekeeper Wesley Henn and his team prepared the grounds for the tests. The beaters of the Moyland shoot were throwing dummies and firing blanks at each test. As a surprise the very well trained spaniels of the beating and picking up team of the shoot were integrated in some tests. The flushing of the spaniels before the retrievers were sent for their retrieves made the tests even more realistic.

For the difficult task of judging 6 judges were present: Jennifer and Gordon Hay, also Graham West from England, Keld Jorgensen from Denmark, Anja Möller from Germany and Kurt Becksteiner from Austria. This team of judges provided the competitors with tempting and 'close to the real thing' exercises.

Forty teams of three retrievers and their handlers out of twelve countries competed against each other.

At the end of two well-organised days in a good atmosphere, the final results were proclaimed on Sunday afternoon:

the winner of the IWT Challenge Trophy was the Hungarian team with C. Karai and Int. FTCH Blackthorn Achenar, R. Kószó and Golden Real Gold Storm, T. Zsolt and Blachthorn Grus and reserve O. Kiraly and Golden Whispering Oaks Gambler.

Due to a promise that could not be kept, we did not have a European Field Trial Championship for Retrievers in 2013. Since our commission normally gathers on the occasion of this Field Trial Championship, our meeting was also postponed. Our meeting is planned for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July in Denmark, where on the 5<sup>th</sup> and the 6<sup>th</sup> the International Working Test will be organised.

The national delegates and myself would like to thank everybody that contributed to what went well for the retriever community in 2013.

## FCI SHOW JUDGES COMMISSION - Activity report

Our Annual meeting was held as usual in the first week of February. Our hosts were our Colombian colleagues in Cartagena. We are grateful to the Colombian canine organisation for their best hospitality and for our memories of an educative, meaningful and agreeable weekend. The weekend was an unforgettable one, not only because of the nice weather, the best hospitality, a visit to a beautiful island, but also because it was full of work and discussions in two committees, leading to important proposals for the FCI General Committee. It is a pity that from the South American Section there were so less delegates present. It was the perfect possibility to feel the importance of this committee at first hand.

Unfortunately, the FCI General Committee could only decide in October 2013 about our proposals, so a lot of time was left waiting for answers.

However, the proposals that were been sent to the FCI General Committee were all accepted. This is the crown on hard work and good preparation by all of us. Thank you all for your cooperation!

### Proposal 1

Mutual recognition of Judges by FCI and KC. The president and vice president of our commission have discussed a concept statement in London twice this year. This led to a revised statement and some agreements that both boards (FCI's and KC's) have to discuss further in 2014.

### Proposal 2

European Judges List. The FCI has approved to coordinate this website from January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014. More and more countries participate in this international list and more and more organisers use it to develop their judges lists for shows. However, there still are some technical problems that make a friendly use for NCO's not always so easy. Norsk Kennelclub is working on it to solve the problems.

### Proposal 3

A great step forward was our proposal of a uniform FCI Judges Contract. This contract has been accepted by the FCI General Committee with some amendments. The proposal will be implemented. The contract will be posted on the FCI website.

### Proposal 4

Another important issue we discussed in 2013 was to have a basic statement for show judges to take into account that a champion dog has to be fit for function and that this dog has to have correct morphology and physical mind as well as good health in order to its job properly and that dogs that do not fit in this list, can never be champions or Best in Breed. The statement was approved. However, there is no need to "attach" it to the breed standards as also requested, as most of its contents is already included in the breed standards. It is however considered important to give to this statement the visibility it deserves. A – revised in English – statement will be published on the

FCI website. We think this approval shows that the FCI General Committee really understands the importance of breeding and judging healthy dogs with a good behaviour.

### Proposal 5

Our aim to have a uniform education for every individual breed, developed by the country of origin of the breed for international use will be a step closer to reality. The FCI General Committee approved our proposal and they will send our Basic PowerPoint to all NCO's with the request to develop PowerPoints in English for their own breeds. We will make arrangements for breeds whose origin is in non-FCI countries. The first PowerPoint we received was a really special one from the Swedish canine organisation, about the Swedish Vallhund.

### Proposal 6

There is an AKC Rule that says that foreign judges have to do a test before they can judge at AKC Events. The FCI General Committee was asked to discuss this matter with the AKC and ask them to exempt judges from this ruling. The FCI General Committee approved our request.

### Proposal 7

To ask FCI to approve a ruling for FCI Show Judges who move abroad and implement it immediately. This request was approved and will be effective from January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014.

### Proposal 8

Approval to change Judges Fees for CACIB in Europe, World and Section Shows into € 50 per day for a judging day and € 35 per day for a travelling day. Our request was approved. Changes will be effective from January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014.

### Proposal 9

Through the FCI General Committee, the Standard Commission will be asked to use pictures of the breed that are very close to the ideal type and delete the sentence under the pictures. This will be for new or newly adopted standards. The Standard Commission will also be asked to be careful with drawings of dogs to be enclosed into standards.

During 2013, we have also been working on several items:

- a. Starting to use the PowerPoint Model for the education "judging dog breeds". We would like to build up our digital "dog library" filled by all NCO's. A new FCI circular at the end of the year asked the NCO's to develop PowerPoint presentations for at least a few national breeds before July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014.
- b. During 2013 our President has been talking to his colleagues from other commissions to hear their aims, wishes and problems. He also talked about the FCI General Committee and its future under the new FCI President. We are happy to communicate with judges all over the world about their education and development in judging.

- c. Together with the FCI Office we were involved in several requests, remarks and complaints regarding judges. All cases could be solved in a positive way.

In 2013 the executive committee of this commission consisted of:

- Horst Kliebenstein, President (Germany)
- Carla Molinari, Vice-president (Portugal)
- John Wauben, Secretary (The Netherlands)



Our President, Vice-president and Secretary met once this year. Several topics were discussed in the past year by email and several times at shows. You will largely find these mentioned on the agenda.

We thank Yves De Clercq and his colleagues from the FCI office in Thuin for the way in which our documents were at all times sent promptly and correctly translated to our members and our thanks also go to the FCI General Committee member Tamàs Jakkel who supported and defended our proposals at all times.

2013 passed quickly. Another year in which social pressures on our dogs, and on ourselves as show judges, intensified considerably in many countries. We must jointly make a strong case for promoting fine but, especially, healthy and social dogs as well that are fit for their function, to ensure that cynology does not end in an irreversible downward spiral. That will have to be a basic theme of our discussions and concerns in the coming years.

## FCI COMMISSION FOR SIGHTHOUNDS RACES - Activity report

The Year 2013 was a year of changes in our commission: Mr Haas was not available anymore to fulfil another term as President. To replace him there was only one candidate: the undersigned Hubert Iser.

To avoid that there would be a President and a Secretary from the same country Mr Hendricks gave back his mandate as a Secretary. He was replaced by Mrs Veronika Kúcerove-Chrpova from Czech Republic.

The elections took place in Greppin (Germany) on June 21<sup>st</sup>, on the occasion of the annual meeting of the commission. Due to these changes, there are no figures available about the number of CACIL races and lure-coursing run. We planned 89 races en 75 lure-coursings.

The European Championship Lure-Coursing was held in Greppin – Halbinsel Pouch (Germany) on 22-23 June. Over 800 participants took part. The results can be found at [www.dwzrv.de](http://www.dwzrv.de)

The European championship Racing was held in Versoix (Switzerland) on 7-8 September, with 352 participants. The results can be found at [www.igwr.ch](http://www.igwr.ch)

During this championship the decision of the commission to perform a control measurement on all Whippets and Italian Greyhounds was carried out with the following results:

### Procedure

Because the control took place under unusual circumstances – on a racetrack and in the presence of many other dogs – a tolerance of 1 centimetre was granted. The control was divided into two steps:

- a) a swift control executed by Mr Christian Magré, a French show- and working judge. He measured all dogs except the French. The French dogs were measured by myself. The owners/handlers of the dogs came into a separated room. First they were shown a drawing of the position the dog should take. Then the dog was put into this position by the owner/handler on a wooden board, on which two strips of 1 centimetre height were attached. The dog was positioned with its forelegs between these strips. The measurement

tool was then placed upon the dog's withers and on the 1 cm-high strips. If the dog's height was correct, a green light on the measurement tool was lit. If the dog was too tall, a red light was lit. The dogs which passed this control were immediately accepted.

- b) The dogs which did not pass the swift control were directed to another room, where they were re-measured by the commission's delegate for the championship, Mr Andreas Huschka. He carried out the measurement, according to the rules (10 measurements).

### Results of this procedure

Whippet males: 12 out of the 64 announced dogs were absent (= 18.75%). From the remaining 52 dogs, 10 were too tall at the first measuring (= 19.23%); 4 of them passed at the second measurement. Finally, 11.54% of the measured dogs were rejected and only 46 dogs came to the start after 1 dog was withdrawn before the competition.

Whippet females: 17 out of the 61 announced dogs were absent (= 27.87%). From the remaining 44 dogs, 9 were too tall at the first measurement (= 20.45%); 5 of them passed at the second measurement. Finally, 9.09% of the measured dogs were rejected and only 41 dogs came to the start.

Italian Greyhounds males: 1 out of the 12 announced dogs was absent (= 8.33%). From the remaining 11 dogs, 5 were too tall at the first measurement (= 45.45%); 1 of them passed the second measurement. Finally, 4 (36.36%) of the measured dogs were rejected and only 7 dogs came to the start.

Italian Greyhounds females: 3 out of the 19 announced dogs were absent (= 15.79%). From the remaining 16 dogs, 1 was too tall at the first measurement (= 6.25%); this dog passed the second measurement. Finally, none of the measured dogs was rejected and all 16 dogs came to the start.

The national canine organisation where the rejected dogs are registered received a message in which they were asked to reconsider the licence of those dogs.

The cross-breeding from Sighthounds with other (Sighthounds) breeds is a problem which the FCI Commission for Sighthounds Races wants to solve it. In order to do so, a meeting with delegates from The Netherlands, Germany and Belgium was organised. On this occasion, some proposals are formulated. They will be presented to the other member countries.

**FCI COMMISSION FOR SLEDGE DOGS – Activity report**



In 2013 the FCI Commission for Sledge Dogs continued its work and met in Copenhagen, Denmark on 1-2 June 2013. A perfectly well organised meeting thanks to the organisers from Dansk Polar Hunde Klub and the Danish Kennel Club, D.K.K.

The Commission reelected its Board. Mr Franco Mannato (France) was reelected chairman, Mr Henrik Soeborg (Denmark) vice-chairman and Mrs Eveline Koch (Sweden) secretary.

During the period under review, the work of the commission focused mainly on the discussion and drafting of recommendations for international guidelines for the tests making dogs eligible to enter the “working class” in dog shows as well as the delivery of CACT to enable dogs to become working champions, on a coherent basis.

Guidelines under preparation take into account the two kinds of tests existing currently, the working test and the racing test. The working test is highly appreciated by all participants, but it only exists in Finland at the moment, while racing tests exist in many countries and need to be harmonised. Most discussions focused on the various problems faced by Member countries and how they try to solve them.





A revised version of these guidelines will be discussed and possibly approved at the next meeting of the Commission.

Another issue was also mentioned, the fact that show judges in general have little eye for functional dogs. It is the opinion of the commission that show judges should be more educated about the purpose of the breed and see in practice what is written in the standards as these are sled dogs.

The next meeting of the commission is planned to be held on 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> May 2014 in Bratislava, Slovakia. Immediately after the meeting, all decisions - and possibly the adopted document - will be forwarded to the General Committee for perusal and, whenever possible, adoption.

game, only four countries are regular participants, Italy, Belgium, France and The Netherlands. We hope to be joined by other countries soon.

We will contact the Spanish canine organisation to decide - at the next meeting of the commission to be held in May - about their organising the European Cup.

### Meetings

Two meetings were held in 2013 (9-10 March and 23 September in Roudnice nad Labem, Czech Republic), with delegates from the FCI countries taking part. Also present as guests at the September meeting were representatives from the AWDF (American Working Dog Federation) and Israel. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all delegates who took part for their cooperation.

### FCI 2013 World Championship for Tracking Dogs

The 2013 FCI World Championship for Tracking Dogs took place on 10-14 April in Ebeltoft, Denmark. I would like to extend my thanks to the organisation committee, with Ms Vivi Gilsager at the head of a team of helpers. The dogs taking part in the Ebeltoft event, judged by Mr Frederic Clemens Straus from Belgium and Mr Terje

Hammers from Norway, performed extraordinarily well. The event, in which 38 dogs from 19 different countries competed, was supervised by Mr Pentti Rapila from Finland.

The title of 2013 World Tracking Dog Champion went to Mr Marco Dreyer, with his German Shepherd Dog "Erik von Waliboer Land" scoring a total of 194 points. Germany came out top of the 2013 country rankings, collecting a total of 385 points. The following assessments were awarded: 1 excellent, 4 very good, 5 good, 1 satisfactory. 26 failed to pass. One dog was disqualified.

The 2014 FCI World Championship for Tracking Dogs will be taking place in Oberdorla-Thüringen, Germany.

### FCI 2013 European Open for Tracking Dogs

The 2013 FCI European Championships for Tracking Dogs took place on 17-20 October in Cormons, Italy. I would like to extend my thanks to the organisation committee, with Daniele Peres at the head of a team of helpers. The 30 participants came from 13 different FCI countries.

The dogs taking part in the Cormons event, judged by Mr Peter Lengvarsky from Slovakia and Mr Saso Cvek from Slovenia, performed extraordinarily well.

The event was supervised by Mr Mike Greub from Switzerland.

The title of 2013 European Tracking Dog Champion went to Mr Zdravco Klicek from Switzerland, with his German Shepherd Dog "Fait t Palameinehof" scoring a total of 194 points.

The following assessments were awarded: 1 excellent, 8 very good, 10 good, 3 satisfactory, 4 insufficient. Two dogs failed to finish.

### FCI 2013 World Championships for Utility Dogs

The 2013 FCI World Championships for Utility Dogs took place in Roudnice nad Labem (Czech Republic) on 19-22 September, with 127 participants from 36 countries competing.

The originally selected judge for Section C, Mr E. Scherkl from Germany, had to be replaced by Mr A. van den Bosch from Belgium on account of a breach of animal protection regulations.

I would like to extend my thanks to the organisation team headed by Mr Vaclav Kejr and Mr Martin Cecho. The preparations for this event took 2 years, and led to the

event being conducted in an exceptionally orderly and conscientious manner.

Both participants and spectators of this World Championship expressed their great satisfaction with the organisation.

This World Championship was judged by Mr Zdravco Klicek from Croatia (Tracking), Ms Lene Carlson from Denmark (Obedience) and Mr Alphons van den Bosch from Belgium (Protection). It was supervised by Mr Wilfried Schäpermeier from Germany.

The title of 2013 FCI World Utility Dog Champion went to Jozef Adamuscin from Slovakia, with his German Shepherd Dog "Chris Spod Lazov" scoring a total of 293 points. Slovakia won the team championship, gaining a total of 855 points.

Results: 3 excellent, 40 very good, 61 good, 3 satisfactory, 13 insufficient. 4 dogs were ill and 3 disqualified.

The 2014 FCI World Championship for Utility Dogs will be taking place in Malmö, Sweden.

This seminar went very well, with 53 judges from 22 FCI countries taking part. Judges from the American Working Dog Federation (AWDF) were also present. All judges worked together to judge 3 dogs in the categories Obedience and Protection, with the different assessments subsequently discussed in detail.

On behalf of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs, I would like to thank the speakers - Günther Diegel and Wilfried Schäpermeier from Germany, and Robert Markschläger from Austria, for all the work they put into their presentations.

The theme of the seminar was: 1 year after the introduction of the amended FCI IPO guidelines, and national and international judging.

The decision was taken at the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs' meeting of 23 September for the 2016 FCI World Championship for Utility Dogs to be held in Slovakia and for the corresponding 2017 event to take place in Germany. The 2015 World Championship for Utility Dogs had already been awarded to Switzerland.

The meeting also saw the following decisions being taken:

A. Judges for World Championships will be selected 3 years in advance.

B. From 2014 onwards, the annual judges' seminar will be held in the form of regional training courses and special courses for judges selected to judge World Championship events.

In its October 2013 meeting in Helsinki, Finland, the FCI General Committee approved the following proposals submitted by the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs:

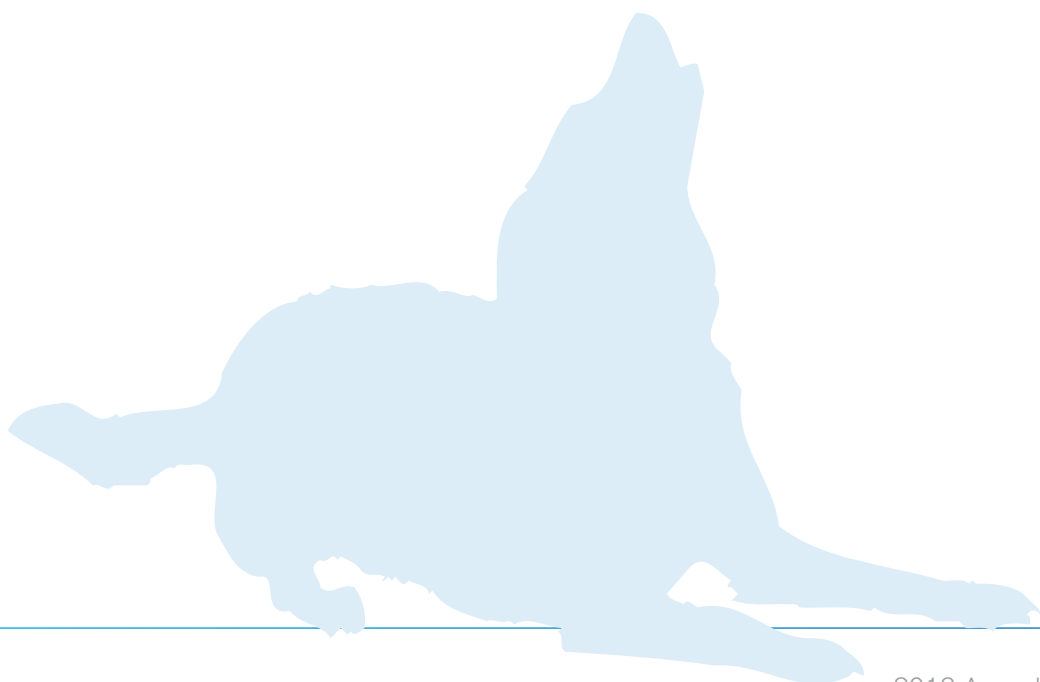
- the amended regulations for FCI World Tracking Dog Championships;

### Comments on the Balance sheets as of 31.12.2013

#### Assets

##### Fixed Assets

The item **“Land”** corresponds to the purchase value of the plot of land purchased in 2011 in Thuin.

The other Fixed Assets refer to net values after depreciation. The gross values (i.e. before depreciation) amount to €761,001 for property, plant and equipment (PPE) and to €131,376 for furniture and computer hardware.

Ongoing Assets (Work in progress) relate to the planning costs and fees already incurred for the new building.

##### Current Assets

The item **“Goods stock for resale”** covers inventories related to the FCI Centenary (Cobby, FCI Centenary Book). The value of this inventory was reduced by 50% in 2013 and another similar reduction will be operated end of 2014 to bring the value of the stock down to 0.

The item **“Trade Debtors”** consists mainly of outstanding amounts to be received from our member countries. These were kept at a normal level in 2013.

The item **“Investments and cash money”** is greatly dependent on stock market developments (securities) even though the value of the whole portfolio is secured. Our liquidity continues to be excellent.

### Liabilities

The increase in the item **“Accumulated Profits”** corresponds to the annual profits for 2013.

The item **“Allocated fund for dismissal”** covers statutory reserves for staff; the defined objective is to have

this fund grow - via annual payments - to reach the annual payroll amount. 2013 saw the sum of €100,000 again being allocated to this fund.

The decrease in **“Provisions”** reflects the reversal of provisions amounting to €25,000 for the 2013 General Assembly.

**Trade Debts** increased by €48,000 in 2013, while **Social Debts** rose by €27,000. The levels of both items are normal.

## Comments on the Profit and Loss account (contents and major differences vis-à-vis the previous financial year)

### Operating Income

Revenues from international shows (**CACIB fees**) represent the FCI's main source of income; this year they have been higher than in the previous year. The other CACI awards and the Kennel Names similarly reached the same level as in 2012.

The item "**Miscellaneous**" under "Other operating income" covers mainly revenues from advertising and sponsoring. These basically remained at the same level as in the previous year.

### Operating Charges

The main factors contributing to the increase in the item **Remuneration** are certain, necessary or legally required, wage adjustments and the associated expenditure on social security contributions.

An excellent agreement with a new printing company led to a decrease in printing costs in 2013. In addition, another very good agreement with the Post Office resulted in a significant decrease in Stamps, despite 2013 being a "General Assembly Year" with lots of documents to send to the members.

In years when a **General Assembly** takes place, the annual financial statements also include the actual costs for the GA (2013). In the interim years, provisions are made for this event.

The task-force "**International Partnership for Dogs and DogWellNet.com**" generated costs totalling €75,782: a big investment for a project yet to be born, considered however essential.

The increase in expenditure on meetings of the **General and Executive committees and mandatory**

**commissions** is mostly attributable to the fact that the General Committee met 3 times in 2013 and to the new working method of the Executive Committee that included 3 meetings as well.

Expenditure on **Legal and accountancy fees** relates to our accounting and auditing firm and to our lawyer in Belgium. It should be pointed that we no longer have a mandatory Legal Commission in the FCI.

The increase in expenditure on "**Translations, Marketing, Internet**" can be mainly attributed to the sharp rise in costs on marketing actions (FCI stand at different shows, production of gadgets, etc.) and Internet remodelling (online tools).

The item "**Other operating charges**" combines several expenditure items which together increased by a total of €20,000. This increase mainly reflects expenditure for "Members on duty" and for "Partnership and membership".

The reversal of **provisions** amounting to €25,000 refers to the provisions made in 2012 for the 2013 General Assembly.

**Operating profit** amounts to €86,000 (2012: €136,000).

**Financial income** includes the value adjustments in the securities portfolio as well as earnings from securities and liquid assets. The item has decreased by €23,000 in 2013, mainly due to the present low interest rates.

**Allocated fund:** cf. notes on the balance sheet item "Affected Fund for dismissal".

The **result posted for the year** amounts to €30,000 (2012: €104,000).

### **REPORT TO THE FCI GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON THE ANNUAL ACCOUNTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING 31 DECEMBER 2013**

Pursuant to the request of Mr DE CLERCQ, Executive Director of the FCI, we submit our report in our capacities as external auditors.

We audited the annual accounts for the fiscal year ending 31 December 2013, drawn up based on the fundamental accounting principles as applied in Belgium, for which there is a balance sheet total of € 4.176.504,30 and for which the profit and loss account shows a profit for the year of € 29.384,06.

Our responsibility is to give an opinion on these annual accounts based on our audit. We executed our audit in compliance with the legal provisions and in accordance with the auditing standards that are applied in Belgium, as decreed by the *Institut des Reviseurs d'Entreprises*.

These auditing standards require that our audit be planned and executed to obtain reasonable assurance that the annual accounts do not have any significant anomalies, whether they result from fraud or from error.

In accordance with the above-mentioned auditing standards, we took into account the Federation's administrative and accounting organization as well as its system of internal control. We obtained the explanations and information we needed for our audit from the Federation's managing body and its officers. We examined, on a test basis, the evidence supporting the amounts that appear in the annual accounts. We assessed the accounting policies used and the reasonable nature of the significant accounting estimates made by the association as well as the overall presentation of the annual accounts. We believe that the audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the annual accounts for the year ended 31 December 2013 present fairly the assets, the Federation's financial position and its results of its operations in conformity with the general accounting principles as applied in Belgium.

### Letter of Understanding between FCI and AKC

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and The American Kennel Club (AKC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting purebred dogs; and

WHEREAS the parties hereto have in the past cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out this object and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose; and

WHEREAS it is agreed that the relations between AKC and FCI and its member registries should be explicitly written with a view towards future cooperation;

NOW, this letter of understanding encompasses the mutually agreed to basis for the relationship between the parties as follows:

1. AKC will recognize the pedigree for any FCI registry that meets AKC requirements and that wishes to have such recognition.
2. AKC will not automatically give exclusive recognition to the FCI registry in any country in which there are multiple registries and FCI will not automatically give exclusive recognition to AKC's registry in the United States.
3. AKC will not register any dog born in an FCI member country until that dog has been registered in the Stud Book of the FCI registry or the AKC-recognized registry in that country. No dog born in the USA, belonging to breeds recognized by the AKC, will be registered by an FCI member registry unless the dog has been registered in the FCI-recognized registry in the United States. It is up to the FCI to decide about the registration of dogs born in the USA belonging to breeds not recognized by the AKC.
4. Each of the parties agree that when any information comes to its knowledge which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (AKC judges suspension, amended standards, etc.), it will immediately communicate such information to the other party.
5. FCI and AKC will deal with the judging approval reciprocity in a separate document (see attachment).

6. AKC will not sponsor any event in the country of an FCI member without the express permission of FCI and the FCI member. FCI will not sponsor any event within the territory of the United States without the express permission of AKC. Puerto Rico is exempted from this provision as both AKC and FCI have been previously sponsoring activities on that island.
7. While not an FCI member, FCI has graciously agreed to permit AKC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, Obedience, etc. Championship Event provided that this participation does not prevent representative teams of FCI member organisations from taking part. If the AKC teams win the competition, they are not eligible for the title of FCI Winner at these events.
8. AKC registered dogs are eligible for the title of FCI International Champion under specific conditions to be agreed upon by the AKC and FCI.
9. Except with the agreement of the AKC, the FCI will not register kennel names for breeders living in USA (with exception of Puerto Rico) and, except with the agreement of the FCI, the AKC will not register kennel names for breeders living in countries where the FCI has a member, which the AKC has accepted.
10. FCI agrees to send to the AKC headquarters all revised breed standards and AKC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters copies of its Complete Dog Book, which includes all AKC standards, each time that such publication is revised.
11. The terms of this letter of understanding is agreed to by the parties listed below. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon reasonable notification to the other party.

### Breed Judging

At FCI CACIB international shows, the AKC judges are eligible to judge and award the CACIB provided that the two following conditions are fulfilled:

1. the breeds they are scheduled to judge are recognised by the AKC (this does not include FSS and Miscellaneous classes).
2. the judges in question are allowed to judge, under AKC regulations, the breeds in question at AKC events and award them championship points. An AKC judge, residing in the United States, may not be approved as an FCI judge (breed, group, all breed) eligible to award CACIB.

At AKC events, the FCI judges are eligible to judge and award championship points provided that the following conditions are fulfilled:

1. the breeds they are scheduled to judge are recognised by the FCI and by the national kennel club, in their country of residence, which has jurisdiction over the judges in question
2. the judges are members of their national kennel club, in their country of residence, which is an FCI member or contract partner
3. the judges in question are allowed to judge, under FCI regulations, the breeds in question at FCI International CACIB shows and award them the CACIB

### Group and BIS Judging

It is up to both, the AKC and the FCI members, to choose to invite or not a judge to judge a particular group (according to FCI or AKC breed nomenclature) at an AKC event or at an international FCI CACIB show taking into consideration the experience of the judge, his judging credentials and the breeds and their numbers in the groups to judge.

**WHEREAS** the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and the Kennel Club (KC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting, in the case of the FCI, pedigree dogs and in the case of the Kennel Club, all dogs; and

**WHEREAS** the parties hereto have in the past cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out this object and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose; and

**WHEREAS** it is agreed that the relations between KC and FCI and its member registries should be explicitly written with a view towards future cooperation;

**NOW**, this letter of understanding encompasses the mutually agreed basis for the relationship between the parties as follows:

1. The KC, where it recognises the breed in question, will recognise the pedigree of any FCI registry that meets KC requirements and that wishes to have such recognition.
2. In so far as it is lawful, the KC will give exclusive recognition to the FCI registry in any country in which there are multiple registries provided that these registries meet KC requirements and the FCI will give exclusive recognition to the KC's registry in the United Kingdom. For the time being this will not include Malta and China.
3. The KC will not register any dog, or issue a pedigree to any dog, born in an FCI member country whose registry the KC recognises, until that dog has been registered in the FCI registry in that country. No dog born in the UK will be registered, or have a pedigree issued, by an FCI member registry unless the dog has been registered by the KC in the United Kingdom.
4. Each of the parties agree that when any information comes to its knowledge which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (KC or FCI judges suspension, amended standards, etc.), it will immediately communicate such information to the other party.
5. The FCI and the KC will endeavour to agree on the conditions to make their respective judges eligible to officiate at events sanctioned by them (FCI and KC).
6. The KC will not sponsor or support any event for dogs in the country of a current FCI member without the express permission of the FCI member. The FCI will not sponsor or support any event for dogs within the territory of the United Kingdom without the express permission of the KC. For the time being this will not include Malta and China.





7. While the KC is not an FCI member, the FCI has graciously agreed to permit the KC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, Obedience, etc. Championship Event provided that this participation does not prevent representative teams of FCI member organisations from taking part. The KC teams may win the competition but are not eligible for the title of FCI Winner at these events.
8. The FCI agrees to send to the KC headquarters all revised breed standards and the KC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters copies of all revised breed standards. The FCI and KC will discuss health issues connected with breed standards on a regular basis.
9. FCI members are allowed to refer to the title of UK Champion by using the abbreviation "UK Ch + name of the dog".
10. Except with the agreement of the KC, the FCI will not register kennel names of breeders living in the UK and, except with the agreement of the FCI, the KC will not register kennel names of breeders living in countries where the FCI has a member, which the KC has accepted.
11. The terms of this letter of understanding are agreed to by the parties listed below. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon reasonable notification to the other party.

### **Memorandum of Understanding between FCI and CKC**

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and The Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting purebred dogs;

WHEREAS the CKC and the FCI have, in the past, cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out these goals and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose;

WHEREAS it is recognized that both the FCI and the CKC are required to operate within the limits of the legislation governing their activities, including their respective constitution and by-laws;

NOW this letter of understanding expresses a mutually agreed to basis for the relationship between the CKC and the FCI as follows:

1. The CKC acknowledges the role of the FCI and its governing institutions as set out in the FCI Statutes as the primary world federation of dog registries.
2. The FCI acknowledges the CKC as the primary kennel club in Canada.
3. The CKC and the FCI agree that when any information comes to the knowledge of one party, which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (judges suspension, amended standards etc.), it will immediately communicate, in writing, such information to the other party.
4. The parties will meet at the request of either of them, within a reasonable timeframe and on basis of a consistent mutually agreed agenda which will include matters of common interest.



5. The FCI agrees to send to the CKC head office a copy of all breed standards with revisions as they occur and CKC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters all CKC breed standards with revision as they occur. The FCI and CKC will also share information concerning the decisions of their respective governing bodies such as the exchange of official publications.
6. The CKC will periodically provide the FCI with a list of the registries from the FCI member countries with which the CKC has reached an agreement providing for the mutual recognition of studbooks and pedigrees. The CKC will get in touch with all the FCI members and contract partners and inform them about the procedure to follow to gain CKC recognition. The FCI will notify the CKC of the accession of any country to FCI membership.
7. The details of a mutual recognition of FCI and CKC judges are written on a document which is part of this contract.
8. The FCI will not sponsor or sanction any event within Canada without the express permission of the CKC.
9. The CKC will not sponsor or sanction any event in an FCI member country without the express permission of the FCI and the agreement of the member country.
10. While not an FCI member, FCI graciously agrees to permit CKC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, and Obedience Championship Events and any forthcoming canine performance event that may be mutually recognized by both organizations.
11. As long as no agreement is reached with regard to the working breeds (according to the FCI nomenclature) between the FCI and CKC, these breeds (CKC-registered dogs) are not eligible for the title of "International Beauty Champion". The non-working breeds (CKC-registered dogs) are eligible for this title provided that they comply with the FCI International Championship Regulations, i.e. 4 CACIB in 3 countries under 3 different FCI judges.
12. The CKC registered dogs are eligible for the other FCI international titles provided that they meet with the FCI requirements.
13. The FCI international directory of kennel names (affixes) is not open to CKC breeders and the FCI cannot guarantee that a CKC kennel name (affix) will not be similar to an FCI registered kennel name (affix) and conversely.

14. Both parties agree that the present Letter of Understanding shall not be interpreted or applied so as to require either party to act in a manner not authorized by or contrary to applicable legislation, including each party's constitution, rules or by-laws.
15. The terms of this Letter of Understanding are agreed to by both parties. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon giving the other party 60 days notice in writing.

### **CKC Judges eligibility to officiate at FCI International Events**

From April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2009, the following dispositions will apply:

- a) CKC judges are allowed to judge in the FCI member countries all-breed, group and specialty national shows, the breeds they are approved to judge in Canada.
- b) CKC judges who have already judged international FCI CACIB shows before December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2007, are allowed to award CACIB at international FCI CACIB shows, FCI World and Sections shows, to the breeds they are approved to judge in Canada.
- c) Once a CKC judge has judged four (4) national shows in four (4) different FCI member countries by the FCI breed standards, he/she is allowed to award CACIB to the breeds he/she is approved to judge in Canada.

It will be the responsibility of the FCI Office and of the judges concerned to keep track of assignments undertaken in an FCI member country. Taking into account the legal restrictions on the exercise of extra-territorial jurisdiction by the CKC, it will be the responsibility of the CKC to communicate them to their judges and the practical implementation and enforcement of the agreed above principles will be under the responsibility of the FCI Office, of the FCI members and the judges concerned.
