

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What we achieved to date SOLVEIG ZETTERSTRØM Olso, Norway

In FCI Rally Obedience we have a sign set with a total of 89 different signs in addition to the Start and Finish sign. If you want to print the signs out, you will find the sign-set here: <u>www.fci.be/en/</u> <u>Rally-Obedience-4746.html</u>

The signs are divided into four different categories. We have 1-point signs, 2-point signs, 3-point signs and 4-point signs. The value on the signs indicates the degree of difficulty on the signs. 1-point signs are the signs with the lowest difficulty, and 4-point signs are the signs with the highest difficulty. In an FCI Rally Obedience course there must be at least 7 of the 4-point signs, and at least 5 of the 3-point signs. It is a rule that the level of the FCI course must be difficult enough.

When designing a course layout judges should focus on a good mix of fluent, stopping, position, figure, distance, sending, jumping and recall exercises, as well as left and right handling.

The team starts with 100 points. Deductions are made based on the judge's assessment of the team's performance. During the course and when the team is performing exercises, the judge must take into account the dog's breed, size and specific temperament while judging.

In the FCI Regulations you find pictures of the signs, and a description of how to perform each sign. It's not only information about how to perform the exercise, but also information about what exercise area the sign has. In FCI Rally Obedience we have four different exercises areas. They are named A, B, C and D, and you find more information about them in the Regulations in point 4.3. The name of the signs are written like this; "101 DOWN (A)",. It's the number of the signs first, then the name of the sign, and in the end it's the name of the exercise area.

You gain a lot of knowledge about FCI Rally Obedience by reading the Regulations but it's not always easy to understand just by reading. Therefore, we have made a film-demo of all the FCI signs. We have used different dogs in the demo. Small dogs, medium dogs and large dogs. We hope that a filmdemo will help you to understand the requirements of the exercises, and also inspire you to practice with your own dog.
